**In the contest**, at Raleigh on Thursday, for Republican Champion of North Carolina Eaves knocked Mott out on first round.

**ON Thursday** the Democrats of Indiana nominated Claude Matthews, the most extensive farmer in the State, for Secretary of State.

**It is said** that Pennsylvania capitalists have \$50,000,000 invested in Southern enterprises. Other Northern and Western capitalists have many more invested. This has its influence against the Force bill.

**A TAX** of any kind is a burden and a loss. Taxation must be tolerated because it is necessary. Without it all government must cease. But true and wise political science aims always to lessen this burden.—Wilmington Messenger.

**THE Republican State Convention** met in Raleigh on Thursday. E. E. Smith, colored, was made temporary chairman. Charles Price was nominated for Chief Justice and W. T. Faircloth for Associate Justice. Eaves was elected Chairman of the Executive Committee.

**MR. E. O. WORRELL** has invented, and had made at the Globe Manufacturing Company, a machine that with one man and two horses, does the work of seven men and four horses in planting cotton as compared to the old way of doing that work. It sows the fertilizer, lists the land, rounds up the land, rounds up the bed, opens it, plants seed and covers them.

**A CLERGYMAN** has written the New York Sun his views on the Kemmler execution, and closes his vigorous letter as follows: "If every person henceforth knew that if he murdered a fellow being just as surely would he have the experience of Kemmler, I know murder would decrease. The execution by electricity, with all its weird and horrible features, is just the method to move the superstitious fears of the great criminal class. I, for one, would like to sign a petition to the State Legislature against doing away with it."

Captain Hartelius, the pioneer officer of the Salvation Army at New Berne, will conduct grand salvation meetings at the barracks on the corner of Hancock and Broad streets at 7 a. m., 11 a. m., 3 p. m., and at 8 p. m. Everybody is cordially invited to attend.

The Eastern North Carolina Sunday-school Convention will be held at Edenton September 18th and 19th. On the program, which is quite an extended one, we notice two assignments to Prof. G. T. Adams, of this city, "The Work of Sunday-schools in Other Lands," and "The Art of Questioning."

Capt. H. H. Dowdy, of Bayboro, has returned from Norfolk, where he has been to secure a boat to be put on the route from Bayboro to South creek and Pantego, where the new railroad recently completed to McKay's ferry and Edenton will be tapped. The steamer will go on in two or three weeks and will take both passengers and freight. Cannot the line be extended to New Berne?

**Preparing for a Big Camp Meeting.**  
The annual Methodist camp meeting at Lane's Chapel, north side of Neuse river, six miles from Street's ferry, will begin on the 5th of September and last two weeks. Everybody is invited to attend.

Parties coming by steamer will land at Lane's landing, which is but one mile from camp ground. Ample preparations will be made to feed both man and beast at a reasonable rate. Comfortable quarters will be furnished ladies who desire to stay over, free. Gentlemen will be provided with camps as a nominal figure. **"Peg-Leg" Williams**  
Emigrant agent, R. A. Williams, better known as "Peg-Leg," was on the morning train. He claims to have taken out 22,000 colored people last season to Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas and Texas, and wants to secure 20,000 more farm hands in the next six months to work on shares. He offers to supply tools, seed, mules, land and houses to live in free and give one-half the crop made; also to pay the railroad fare and furnish provisions to be paid for out of the crop.

These are very flattering inducements, but we think it would be well for the colored people who are favorably impressed with these tempting offers to act cautiously, and before abandoning pleasant North Carolina homes, at least to correspond with those who have preceded them and learn how they are faring, and get their opinion of their new surroundings, and thus be enabled to act understandingly in the matter.

**Opening of Vance Academy.**

This excellent school will open tomorrow. Hereafter the male department will be a military school. Connected with the military will be a cadet brass band. The instruments for the band have already arrived, and the uniforms have been arranged for, and ere long the boys will be equipped with guns.

Prof. Skinner has engaged pupils from Kentucky and Virginia, and from the counties of Craven, Jones, Onslow, Beaufort, Pamlico, Hyde, Martin, Greene, Harnett and Wayne.

There were pupils in Vance Academy last session from nine different counties, and the prospects are that during the present year fifteen counties will be represented among the pupils.

Another Big Enterprise for New Berne  
Mr. A. Greenbaum, of Seaford, Del., has been in the city a few days making preliminary arrangements for establishing a canning factory. We are glad to announce that satisfactory arrangements have been concluded. He has secured a building at Union Point from Mr. J. A. Meadows. He will now proceed to get in his machinery and make his final preparations, and in November will commence canning operations. He will employ three or four hundred hands.

We extend him a cordial greeting. We are ever ready to welcome and encourage all such enterprises. We have had a large canning factory in operation for several years and the fact that it is now enlarging its capacity one-half is sufficient evidence that it is a profitable investment for the owners. Our oysters and vegetables are choice and abundant and we are glad to see them utilized in this way. These factories increase the demand for the products of our waters and soil and by affording additional employment put more money in circulation, thus directly or indirectly benefitting all classes of citizens. We wish Mr. Greenbaum abundant success, which we doubt not he will achieve.
