MAMMOTH TOMATOES.

MR. JESSE HARRISON saw the statement of a Durham man that he had a 15 1/2 ounce tomato. To show what kind New Berne raises he has brought us down one of the Cleveland Beauty variety, that weighs 17 ounces. He had one tomato that weighed 14 pounds. Thirteen of his tomatoes weighed 195 ounces, an average of exactly 15 ounces each. A dozen of them filled an ordinary painted peck water bucket, such as are usually sold at groceries, full and heaped up three inches above the brim. He did not think it worth while to tell about them "in the paper," but when he discovered that another town was bragging on a 15 1/2 ounce tomato he wanted to let them know that they were not beating New Berne. When our truckers get in a notion to show what they raise, other places find it pretty difficult to equal New Berne products.

THE CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION HELD AT KINSTON.

W. J. Rogers, of Northampton, Nominating.

The convention held at Kinston yesterday for the nomination of a candidate for Congress from the second district, resulted in the nomination of W. J. Rogers, an Alliance man of Northampton county.

Only two names were before the convention, Hon. F. M. Simmons and Mr. W. J. Rogers, that of Mr. J. M. Mowborne having been withdrawn in caucus.

Rogers and Mowborne both were Alliance candidates, and the nomination is nothing less than an Alliance victory. As that may be, the nomination was made unanimous and Mr. Rogers will find no warmer supporters than the friends of Mr. Simmons.

Mr. Simmons himself desires us to offer his services to canvass the district, or work in any way that lies in his power for the election of Mr. Rogers. This district is a close one and to win success will require the mightiest efforts of the Democracy. Let there be no lukewarmness nor half-hearted work, but let all the friends of good government exert themselves earnestly, enthusiastically and persistently from now until the day of election and we may be once again rewarded with victory.

Below we give the proceedings of the convention as furnished by our special correspondent:

KINSTON, N. C., Sept. 3, 1890.

The convention held here today was most harmonious. There were three candidates in the field: Hon. F. M. Simmons, J. M. Mowborne, of Lenoir, and W. J. Rogers. Two of the last named gentlemen were Alliance men. The contest since Tuesday has been a heated one, and early this morning the force of Simmons withdrew into a private room in order to estimate his strength. It was then learned that Alliance delegates were in the majority two to one, and Simmons' hope was in the eloquence of your Manly and your Stevenson.

In the Alliance caucus the names of Messrs. J. M. Mowborne and W. J. Rogers were submitted to the delegates, and W. J. Rogers having received the greatest number of votes, it was decided by the Alliance men not to place Mr. J. M. Mowborne's name before the convention.

The convention was called to order at 12 o'clock by Fred Woodard, of Wilson, who addressed the convention in words full of wisdom.

The various committees having been appointed, the convention adjourned until 1:30 o'clock.

Assembling at 1:30 o'clock, Jno. C. Wooten, jr., was recommended as chairman, C. C. Daniels, secretary, E. G. Butler, assistant secretary. The convention was then ready for business, and the chairman announced that nominations were in order. The name of Hon. F. M. Simmons was placed in nomination, which was heralded with tremendous applause. W. J. Rogers was nominated amidst applause equally as great. The speech of your Manly rung with eloquent appeals in behalf of Craven's candidate, and this was followed by one from Mr. Stevenson in words that burned with fire. But all was to no avail, and Craven's candidate, who had done so much for his district and for his people, was to go down in defeat before the irresistible tidal wave composed of the Farmers' Alliance.

The total number of votes was 349. Of these Rogers received 210, only 175 being necessary for a choice, and Simmons received 139. This was on the first ballot.

The speech of Hon. W. H. Kitchin urging harmony whoever the nominee might be, did much to make the convention unanimous in the nomination after the first ballot. The following is the vote by the respective counties: Bertie, Simmons 17; Rogers, 17. Craven, Simmons, 29; Rogers, 0. Edgecombe, Simmons, 13; Rogers, 22. Greene, Simmons, 20; Rogers, 0. Halifax, Simmons, 18 2/3; Rogers, 33 1/3. Jones, Simmons, 13; Rogers, 2. Lenoir, Simmons, 13 5/7; Rogers, 18 2/7. Northampton, Simmons, 0; Rogers, 37. Vance, Simmons, 1; Rogers, 30. Warren, 4 4/5; Rogers, 10 1/5. Wilson, Simmons, 22 1/2; Rogers, 20 1/2. F. M. H.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

September 2, 1890.

Regular meeting of the board was called to order by Mayor Battle, with Councilmen Slover, Lovick, Cosby, Miller, Holly and Kennedy present.

Petitions of Churchill & Parker, W. H. Tooker, to erect sheds, Sarah Oxley two frame buildings, and E. M. Pavia two canning factories, were all referred to fire district committee with power to act.

The clerk was instructed to issue voucher to the Mayor for \$150 to pay for assistants in testing the electric lights.

Streets and pumps committee reported repairs necessary to the aqueduct at foot of King street, and on motion the Marshal was instructed to notify Messrs. Clark & Co. to have the aqueduct repaired and secure proper drainage.

On motion, W. F. Bell and A. G. Oden were allowed \$25 each for three months' services in lighting lamps, and the clerk ordered to notify them to discontinue lighting the lamps.

On motion, the committee on streets and pumps were requested to continue their investigations as to best method of cleaning out the drain wells and report to the next meeting of the board. The matter of pump at upper end of Broad street was recommended to the committee on streets and pumps with power to act, and voucher ordered to be issued, not to exceed \$40, as soon as well was accepted by committee.

Cemetery committee reported that the fences about city lots in Cedar Grove cemetery had not been built as yet.

Ordinance and license committee reported favorably upon reducing the license on merchandise brokers to \$1.00 per month from Sept. 1st, and on motion the board concurred in the report. City Marshal's report, as follows, was read and adopted:

New Berne, Sept. 2, 1890.

To the Mayor and Board of City Council:

Gentlemen—Below please find my report for the month of August, 1890. We have made 33 arrests during the month, of which 4 worked on the streets, 3 were sent to jail, and 1 appealed.

One-half of the above cost collected, \$30.05, was deducted for my fees, the balance, \$25.05, was turned over to the city treasurer.

JOHN M. HARGET, City Marshal.

The Mayor's report, as follows, was read and adopted:

To the Honorable Board of Councilmen of the City of New Berne: Gentlemen—I have the honor to report that during the last month thirty-three cases were tried. Fines were imposed amounting to \$100 and costs amounting \$74.90. In a number of these cases appeals were taken, and in others the penalty was worked out on the streets. This accounts for the fact that a large amount of fines and costs has not been collected in money.

I take occasion to say to the board that the marshal and policemen are to be commended for their fidelity.

During the late colored fair I engaged William Broadstreet and William Eubanks as special police, and I recommend that they be allowed one dollar a day each for services, and that the Mayor be authorized to draw his warrants on the treasurer for the amount.

The report of the auditing committee, as follows, was read and adopted:

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Council of the City of New Berne: Gentlemen—We, the auditing committee, have carefully examined the books of Mr. H. J. Lovick, treasurer of the city, and find them neatly and accurately kept. We also find that he has received from Mr. F. Ulrich, former treasurer, \$90.97; from the tax collector, \$1,370.75; from the city marshal, \$116.09, during the months of May, June and July, and from mortgage loan \$2,000, making in all from all sources \$3,577.84; that we have examined all vouchers which were paid during May, June and July, amounting to \$1,618.44, leaving a balance in the hands of the treasurer of \$2,059.40. We return herewith 72 vouchers properly stamped paid.

The vouchers returned by auditing committee were referred to the finance committee to be cancelled.

The Mayor reported that the committee had made arrangements that in case of emergency the streets would be lighted.

The joint committee on filling dock at Union Point reported that they had given permission asked for.

On motion, the matter of obtaining shells for the streets was referred to the streets and pumps and wharves and docks committee.

Bills allowed, except Trent Lumber

Mills, which was referred to finance committee for investigation and if found correct to order payment. Smallwood & Slover and New Berne Electric Light and Power Company returned unpaid.

On motion, the Mayor's recommendation as to pay of two extra policemen at \$1.00 per day for four days was concurred in.
