COTTON—New Berne market—Sale of 86 bales from 9 1/2 to 9 5/8.

A horse belonging to auctioneer J. W. Eubank dropped dead yesterday, on Broad street, from heart disease, while being driven to a road cart.

The Republican campaign has opened. The first manoeuvre took place at Rocky Run about six miles from the city. The next rally will be Tuesday night at James City.

A large number of whistles were distributed gratis to the small boys yesterday for advertising purposes and there was more music in the air after that than was wanted.

The steam flat Laura, which has been on Howard's way several weeks for repairs, has been launched. The schooner Elizabeth was immediately hauled up in her place.

The Sam Jones meetings begin at Wilmington, Sept. 25th. A number of persons from New Berne have expressed a desire to attend special rates be given over the A. & N. C. R. Superintendent Dill informs us that reduced rates will be furnished if a sufficient party will be gotten up to justify it.

Finding their fall trade increasing to such an extent as to render further assistance necessary, our clothiers, Mr. Jas. M. Howard and Messrs. Barrington & Baxter, have each added another salesman. Mr. Howard has secured the services of Mr. J. W. Wahab of Hyde and Messrs. Barrington & Baxter have Mr. Hugh Credle, from the same county.

Near the mouth of Neuse river, on the south side, bears are reported very numerous and troublesome. They have killed three hogs belonging to Mr. W. M. Lincoln, and several belonging to three other farmers in the neighborhood, and another farmer, Mr. C. H. Sanborn, is losing hogs nearly every day. One of the bears killed sometime ago weighed 380 pounds.

Bit by a Rattlesnake.
Mr. F. T. Banks, who lives near Arrapahoe, Pamlico county, was bitten by a rattlesnake while helping a neighbor raise a barn a few days ago. The snake was under a plank which was overturned. The snake ran under the barn after biting Mr. Banks and was there killed by Rev. Mr. Parsons, Disciple minister, with a shot gun. The snake had thirteen rattles and a button. The bite is on the calf of the leg and Mr. Banks is very low and not expected to live.

Mr. J. V. Williams at Salem.
We clip the following from the Salem, Virginia, Times Register: The brief mention made of the ink factory in our editorial columns last week, appears to have elicited the approval of many of our citizens. In this connection it may be pertinent to add that Mr. Allen has felt justified, notwithstanding all of the stock has not yet been taken, in telegraphing the owner of the ink factory to make no other arrangements, that he felt safe in saying that Salem would provide for the industry. Herein is an illustration of the utility of such enterprise; this one will provide employment for fifty or sixty young people, together with a number of older persons, and of a more desirable class than many others we might indicate, and who especially need employment. Let the good work go on, until there shall be no valid excuse for an idle hand in the community, while at the same time the wealth of the community is being added to.

Mr. J. V. Williams, proprietor of the Williams Ink Company, arrived yesterday and is making arrangements to commence work at once. Ink from Salem, Va., will soon be one of the articles of trade, and necessary to every well kept office in the United States.

State Convention of Democratic Clubs.

Next Wednesday is the day for the Democratic clubs of the State to meet at Raleigh in pursuance of the call of the executive committee of the State Association of Democratic Clubs to perfect plans for a more thorough organization and prepare for an active, aggressive campaign in the political battle upon which we are now entering.

Under the plan of organization every Democratic club is entitled to three delegates, and also to send an additional delegate for every twenty-five members that it has in regular standing. The credentials of the delegates will consist of a certificate signed by the president and secretary of the club sending them.

The time is close, very close at hand. This section ought to be well represented in that convention. What steps are being taken to secure such representation? Have we a Democratic club in existence or not? Prior to the last campaign the New Berne club has organized whenever work was required simply as a campaign club, taking its name from the candidates in nomination, but the prevalent opinion seems to be that its last organization as a Young Men's Democratic Club was meant to be permanent, the members retaining their connection with it, and the officers holding over until their successors were elected. We endeavored to get a copy of the constitution to settle the matter conclusively, but failed to find one. If this is really the way the matter stands there is nothing requisite except for the President, Jas. W. Moore to call a meeting of the old members, admit all new ones that desire to join and appoint the delegates to which we are entitled.

If the club has passed out of existence, we hope that a meeting will be immediately held for organizing one and the proper representation secured.

The Yarboro House offers reduced rates of board to all delegates and other club members, and the railroads are giving reduced rates. One first-class fare pays for the round trip, and Mr. S. L. Dill, general passenger agent, informs us that anyone wishing to attend the meeting, whether he is a member of a club or not, is entitled to the low rates. The convention meets on the 24th and 25th insts. Round trip tickets will be for sale on the 23d, 23rd and 24th, good to return until the 27th inst., at the following rates: From Morehead City and return, \$5.50; Newport, \$5.10; New Berne, \$4.10; Dover, \$3.10; Kinston, \$2.75; La Grange, \$2.30; Goldsboro, \$1.70, and the small intermediate stations in the same proportion. We hope there will be a good attendance.
