Sub Stations of the N. C. Agricultural and Experiment Station.

In order to bring the work of the Experiment Station more directly before the farmers of the various localities of the State and to secure the benefits resulting from experiments on various soils, it has been decided to establish sub-stations in about eight or nine representative localities. These points will be three in the section west of Raleigh, and three in the central section west of Raleigh, and two in the mountainous section. These substations will work in connection with the Central Station at Raleigh in conducting field tests with fertilizers, in testing varieties of grasses, forage crops, fruits, vegetables, etc., in trying improved implements, new agricultural methods, and in the general sense to try experiments in agriculture. 
