Hang out your banners! There is no such word as surrender. We have no criticism to make on the nomination of Captain Rogers; none on the action of the Executive Committee in failing to name his successor. These are of yesterday; our concern is with the things of today.

Under whose banner will you fight, Mewborne's or Cheatham's? That is the question and the only question. The Alliance is already in the field. Alliance men regard it fit and proper that the mantle of Rogers has fallen on the shoulders of Mewborne, and a prompt movement of all the Democratic forces of the district may sweep the field and gain the victory. ### BROWER WILL NOT WITHDRAW.

Though Already Beaten by Williams, Whose Majority Will Be 2,000. GREENSBORO, N. C., Oct. 21.—The report that John M. Brower, the Republican candidate for Congress in this district, would be taken off the ticket and the name of Charles A. Reynolds, of Forsythe, substituted, is without foundation. Postmaster White, of this city, is a member of the Republican Executive Committee, and in an interview with your correspondent today said that no such action had ever been contemplated. "If," said Mr. White, "we cannot elect Brower we cannot elect anybody. We knew that when we nominated him, and we do not contemplate any change." Brower is already beaten.

### UNSAVORY DEVELOPMENTS.

In the joint discussions now being held between him and Williams, the Democratic nominee, Brower is getting decidedly the worst of it, and recent developments as to Brower's private life at Washington are doing him much harm. It is estimated that Williams's majority will be at least 2,000. A heated canvass of this county is being made by the county and legislative candidates. The prospects of a sweeping Democratic victory are good.—Richmond Dispatch.

### IMMENSE PRARIE FIRE.

A 1,000 Acre Coal Field in Danger of Destruction. MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., Oct. 21. A Pierre, S. D., special to the Tribune says: A party of hunters, who have just returned from the Moreau river country, running partly through the Sioux reservation, report vast prairie fire, which is devastating a large scope of country. There is great apprehension that the fire may spread and reach immense coal fields along the source of the Bad river, 1,000 acres of which were recently taken by the Milwaukee road.

### HOLES IN REPUBLICAN POCKETS.

Their Most Damaging Letters and Telegrams Handled Carelessly. CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 31.—A Herald special from Omaha says: Since the passage of the McKinley bill the State has been given the benefit of wide publication of manufacturers' circulars notifying dealers of increased prices, owing to increased tariff. This has had a very depressing effect on the Republican campaign. Yesterday Congressman Dorsey sent the following telegram: M. S. Quay, Beaver Falls, Pa. Have manufacturers quote lower prices, and deny that the McKinley bill raises prices. If this is not done it will cost thousands of votes in Nebraska. The telegram fell into the hands of a Democrat, who gave it out for publication.

### A Test Case in Michigan.

PAW PAW, Mich., Oct. 21.—Seventeen liquor dealers were arrested in this county today under the local option law, which the Supreme Court recently decided constitutional. This is the only "dry" county in the State and the result of these cases will be watched with much interest.

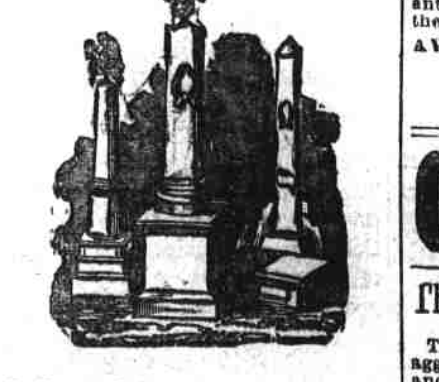
