SENATOR RANSOM.

Senator Ransom addressed the people of Craven on Friday night at the court house in New Berne. Capt. Matt. Manly, chairman of Craven county executive committee, called the meeting to order and General Battle introduced the speaker.

The Senator presented a graphic picture of Reed and the ruin he had made, and then passed to home affairs, eloquently contrasting Democratic government and Republican rule in the State of North Carolina. Returning to national politics he discussed the tariff and showed conclusively that it is the prime cause of agricultural depression all over the land. As the Senator was concluding this part of his great speech the cry of fire was raised, and the large audience was scattered. After the alarm had subsided, many of the people returned to the house, and, as soon as order was restored, the Senator resumed his speech.

In the arraignment of Reed and the discussion of the tariff Senator Ransom displayed great ability, but it was in the presentation of the Force bill that he rose transcendent. His analysis of the bill was faultless, and as he unfolded the panorama of the terrible future every bosom swelled with indignation and every spirit thrilled with high resolve.

Senator Ransom paid eloquent tributes to Senator Vance and Mr. Simmons, which were received with loud applause.

He urged the prompt and enthusiastic support of Mewborne, the Democratic candidate for Congress in this district; showed that he is the nominee of the party, a Southern gentleman and an enemy of the Force bill. The entire Democratic ticket was commended, and the duty enforced of voting the whole ticket.

But for the assertion of the Senator that he was not well, we should say that he was at his best last Friday night. His speech was certainly a very great one and will tell on the election. In behalf of our people we tender to the eloquent Ransom most sincere thanks.

THE ELECTION.

This is the last issue of the JOURNAL before election day, and we appeal to all the people to do their duty to themselves, their country and their God.

It is of very great importance that a Democratic Congress be elected. Congress has become the supreme power in this country. In the olden time the people controlled the Congress, and the member of Congress who did not represent his people was disgraced and driven into retirement. Not content with this, they drove the representatives of the people from the House, and gave their seats to men without credentials and destitute of character, for the sole purpose of increasing the Republican majority and revolutionizing the government. A Democratic Legislature and Democratic county officers must be elected. Patriotism and honor, national integrity, the rights of the States, personal liberty and domestic security, are all involved in the stupendous issues of next Tuesday. The Shameless Doctrines of the Radicals. The following is taken from a recent issue of the National Republican. Read it, white men, whatever your political creed may be, and then ask yourself how any self-respecting white man can vote or work with a party the organ of which advocates such infamous measures:

"When though the operation of the Lodge National Election law six or seven Southern States shall discard Democratic rule, we shall look confidently to some measure of justice done the blacks who have been so long defrauded of their rights.

"Heavy taxes should be laid on the whites to develop and extend the public school system in those States, separate schools for the two races should be abolished, and the plan of bringing the youth of both colors in close and equal relations in schools and churches given a fair trial, as one of the most potent elements to break down the detestable Bourbonism of the South.

"The right of the black man to bear arms should be guaranteed to him, as well the social rights intended to be secured him by the passage of the 14th and 15th amendments to the constitution. The State laws against the intermarriage of the races should be repealed, and discriminations against blacks in the matters of learning trades or obtaining employment should be made a criminal offence, while the colored man's right to hold office should be sacredly protected and recognized. A few years of this policy will solve the race problem satisfactorily."

Cheatham favors the National Election law and represents the above doctrine; Mewborne is opposed to anything of the sort. Which do you favor? Vote your choice. Kinston Free Press.
