Death of a Native New Bernean in Texas.

The Houston, Texas, Daily Post gives an account of the death in that city of Dr. Louis A. Bryan in his 65th year, who, it says, was born in New Berne, N. C., October 12, 1826, but moved away while a boy with his father and graduated in his profession from the medical college at New Orleans, and finally located in Houston, where he did a lucrative practice until the breaking out of the war when he was commissioned as surgeon in charge of the Texas hospital, and followed the Texas army with the location of his hospital, caring for the sick and wounded till the close of the war, when he returned to Houston.

He volunteered his services and went through the memorable yellow fever epidemic in Galveston in 1867, though the great one in Memphis in 1878 and through the one at Jacksonville, Florida, about two years ago.

Besides his practice he was for awhile an extensive planter. He was twice married, and leaves a wife, six children, three grand children and a sister to survive him.

At the University.—The Inter-Society Debate.

CHAPEL HILL, Nov. 2, 1890.
EDITOR JOURNAL: The Philanthropic Society of the University of North Carolina has many members among the men of the east who rank first in public, professional and business life. They are loyal and I know they will receive with great pleasure the news of any fresh victory that the "old Phi" may add to her long list of splendid achievements.

On Saturday evening, November 1, the second semi-annual public inter-society debate came off in the hall of the DuSable Society. It was an occasion of great interest to the entire membership of both societies, and also to the people of the village. A large audience had assembled when, at 8 o'clock, the house was called to order by Mr. J. M. Morehead, of Leaksville, in the chair. Mr. F. C. Mebane, of Wentworth, was secretary, and Messrs. Wm. Guthrie, of Durham, acted as marshals. The query was, "Should there be an Educational or Property Qualification for Franchise?" The debaters were: Messrs. F. P. Eller, of Berlin, and G. H. Crowell, of Asheboro, representing the "Di" Society, in the affirmative, and Messrs. G. W. Connor, of Wilson, and W. H. Wills, of Greensboro, representing the "Phi" Society, in the negative.

The debaters had studied the question thoroughly, and the speeches breathed with argument and force, and kept the audience interested to a degree that at times amounted to enthusiasm. When Mr. Eller jumped into the balance with the opening speech he bore the affirmative side of the scales away down with his weighty argument. Mr. Connor came in with a capital speech, and as he placed it on the negative side it pressed down so heavily that the balance swung up and down, and some thought that they would finally resume their equilibrium, some that the negative side would outweigh the other. Mr. Crowell, displaying remarkable oratorical power, came on and bore down with force on the affirmative, and Mr. Wills filed his argument upon the negative. Then came the rejoinders, sharp replies, arguments attacked and overthrown, and still the scales were unbalanced, when Mr. Wills, the last speaker in the negative, gathered up all his arguments, and hurled them with great force, upon the negative side of the scales, bore that side down and paid it.

The committee appointed to render the decision was composed of Prof. Alexander, Prof. Williams and Rev. Mr. Goushee. The decision, in favor of the negative, was received with great applause.

The "Phi" rejoices, and is proud of her victors, Connor and Wills, while the "Di" loves none the less her Ellis and her Crowell, who were by no means easily conquered. N.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Returns received up to midnight would indicate that the Democrats have a majority of over 130 in the Congress. Phenomenal gains have been made in many States. The representation from all of the States would seem at this time to be about as follows:

Indiana.
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 6.—Half the townships in the State in their returns show an average Democratic gain of 20 to the township. This will make the State Democratic by about 20,000. The Democrats elect 11 out of 13 Congressmen. The legislature will be Democratic on joint ballot by 63.
Mr. Bynum, who has just been re-elected to Congress by a majority of 4,500 in this district, announces himself as a candidate for the speakership of the next House of Representatives.

Widely Different Estimates.
NEW YORK, November 6.—The morning papers' estimate of the complexion of the next House vary considerably. The Times estimates the majority of the Democrats at 151; the Herald makes it 131; the World 141; the Sun 154, and the Tribune 60.

New York, November 6.—Unless official returns make further changes in the list, the Assembly will stand 68 Democrats to 60 Republicans, and the Democrats will have a majority on joint ballot in the Legislature.

Michigan Wholly Democratic.
DETROIT, Mich., November 6.—The whole Democratic State ticket is believed to be elected by from 6,000 to 15,000 plurality. The Democrats have also a majority in the Legislature by about three majorities in the Senate and by some fifteen in the House on Fusion vote with the Patrons of Industry, who hold the balance of power.
It is safe to predict, from late returns, that the State is Democratic by 10,000 majority.

West Virginia.
WHEELING, W. Va., Nov. 6.—The Republicans concede a solid Democratic Congressional delegation.
