THE New York World says: Senator Vance, of North Carolina, is too able a man and too experienced a legislator and debater to be spared from Congress. He may not agree with the farmers at all points, but he will do them more good in the Senate than any new man whom they can elect.

NEWS from Ocala indicates the formation of a new party to be called "The National Union party of America. A Convention has been called. "The effort seems to be to keep the National Farmers' Alliance from inaugurating the new party, and yet to make it the main basis of the new national party."

MRS. MARY TURPIE, mother of Senator Turpie, was burned to death near Delphi, Ind. last Wednesday. She was arranging the fire in an old-fashioned fire place, when her clothing was ignited. She was nearly ninety years old. The accident occurred at the time her gifted son was making his great speech in opposition to the Force bill.

ON Wednesday last Mr. Turpie, of Indiana, in a speech opposing the passage of the Force bill stated facts which show that the northern people are in no way different from

the southern people when it comes to electing proper persons to fill the State and Federal offices and govern the country. In neither section are the negroes allowed the supremacy. There are exceptions to this rule in the South, but none in the North, where hundreds of thousands of negroes are treated with supreme contempt.

**SKETCHES AND POEMS.**

This is the title of a handsome little volume from the press of Green, Burke and Gregory, Norfolk, Va., and written by Mrs. H. Murphy.

The work is not pretentious, yet interesting; the prose material is inspired more especially, by scenes and incidents in Mississippi, Florida and North Carolina, and is mainly a description of the social life and peculiarities of the people, threaded together in interesting narrative form, and are especially kind and approving.

That portion of the book that deals with North Carolina starts at Asheville, and by easy stages reaches and takes in, from mountain to seaboard, the principal towns and cities, reaching our own city where the author journeyed for more than a year.

This journey is not a mere traveler's description, but introduces an interesting character who describes graphically the most salient features of our State and people, socially, historically, scientifically and commercially. The references to our own city are of especial interest to readers of the JOURNAL, and except for an occasional anachronism in referring to our early history are very interesting.

There are many well written poems on a variety of subjects, one being written especially about New Berne, and it, together with other references to our people, is fervid in its praise of their hospitality and courtesy.

The many kindnesses shown the author during her residence here evidently made a deep and lasting impression upon a generous and appreciative nature, and it finds earnest expression in this volume.
