Carolina, and is mainly a description of the social life and peculiarities of the people, threaded together in interasting narrative form, and are especially kind and approving.

That portion of the book that deals with North Carolina starts at Asheville. and by easy stages reaches and takes in. from mountain to seaboard, the principal towns and cities, reaching our own city where the author sojourned for more than a year.

This journey is not a mere trayeler description, but introduces an interesting character who describes graphically the most salient features of our State and people, socially, historically, scenically and commercially. The ref erences to our own city are of especial interest to readers of the JOURSAL, and except for an occasional anachronian in referring to our early history are very

interesting. There are many well written poems on a variety of subjects, one being written especially about New Berne, and it together with other references to our people, is fervid in its praise of their hospitality and courtesy.

The many kindnesses shown the author during her residence here evidently made a deep and lasting impres sion upon a generous and appreciative nature, and it finds earnest expression in this volume.
