THE Baltimore Sun says Senator Hoar admits that the Force bill is dead.

THE corrected returns show that the Democrats have a majority in the Michigan State Senate.

THE Democratic plurality over the Republicans in New York on the congressional vote is 75,616.

MR. IRBY, lately elected Senator from South Carolina, may be a good and able man, but the defeat of Senator Hampton is a public calamity.

DUBLIN, Dec. 11.—Timothy Healy was burned in effigy in this city last night. The feeling against Mr. Parnell's enemies is growing very bitter.

REV. T. B. NEWBERRY announces that he will begin the publication of the North Carolina Baptist, a weekly religious journal, at Fayetteville, on or about the 15th of January.

THE new Apportionment bill will be pushed without regard to the demand for a recount of the population. New York city alone claims 200,000 more of population than Mr. Porter's census gives.

THE Wilmington Star says: "The Supreme Court of Kansas has decided that eighteen delegates to the Legislature, upon whom Ingalls counted for votes, are ineligible. It is said that this lays Ingalls out, sure pop."

THE News & Observer, of Saturday, says: "We have information that light is breaking on the situation relative to the passage of the Force bill, and there is room to hope that it may not pass. It will probably be side-tracked on Tuesday."

NORTH CAROLINA needs an active immigration agent. The Norfolk Virginian says: "It is plain that, in addition to her Commissioner of Agriculture, Virginia needs to restore the office of Immigration Agent. It is a pity that such a valuable official should have been legislated into retirement."

THE Philadelphia Press complains that the Pennsylvania Senators are not doing their duty to the party. It gives no reason why Quay is opposed to the Force bill, but says that Cameron is influenced by personal friendship for Southern Senators, especially Butler of South Carolina, and by his Southern investments.

TEXAS is easily the banner democratic State, the majority at the November congressional election being 166,804. The smallest majority was in the fourth district, where Mr. Culberson beat his opponent 6,620. In the sixth district Mr. Abbott has 25,000 majority and in the eleventh district Mr. Lanham has 24,720. Mr. Mill's majority is 16,005.

The way of relief is through the States rather than through the General Government. Under proper supervision and organized upon a somewhat similar basis as to security of circulation, the local banks could be made as safe and strong as the national banks. They would become an attractive local investment, be under an honest local management, and prove of great local advantage.

Greenville was selected by Conference as the place at which to hold its next session.

A part of the cargo of the steamer Scout, of the Clyde line, Saturday night consisted of canned oysters. There were 10,736 cans weighing 133,550 pounds—691 tons canned oysters! How is that for high?

A special train of four cars was sent up to Goldboro yesterday to bring down colored people who have been working further South. Besides that there was a large number of them aboard the regular passenger train last night.

The pupils of Vance Academy are in good training for the entertainment to be given by them Friday night. They are appropriately costumed, rehearse well, are going to give a nice entertainment at a low admission price, and the money raised will be devoted entirely to two meritorious institutions—the Oxford and Thomasville Orphan Asylums.

We are pleased to announce that Revs. R. A. Willis and T. P. Ricard have each been returned by Conference to their respective churches in this city. The Morehead pastor, Rev. N. M. Watson, and the Beaufort pastor, Rev. G. T. Smith, were also returned to their churches, and Rev. N. M. Jurney, who has been on the Carteret circuit, has been appointed to Robinson circuit near Wilmington.

The fine steam pleasure yacht Nydia, Capt. T. W. Ross, owned by Dr. R. V. Pierce, of Buffalo, New York, the proprietor of the World's Dispensary, a large medical establishment, arrived here yesterday, having Dr. Pierce and his family aboard, on a Southern pleasure tour. They were bound to Florida but were coming up to New Berne, and while anchored in the stream near Smith's creek last night the yacht was accidentally run into by the schooner John B. F. Moore and considerably damaged—both masts broken off, etc., which will necessitate her remaining here awhile for repairs.

Grand Lodge of Colored Masons.
At the session of the colored Grand Lodge of Masons, held in Asheville last week Solicitor Geo. H. White, of this city, was elected Grand Master for the State of North Carolina.

The Lodge also passed resolutions memorializing the State Legislature for an appropriation to aid their orphan asylum at Oxford and also to establish a colored State agricultural college similar to that already established for the whites, urging as one plea that the United States Government annually gives \$25,000 to every State that has such a school for each race, but nothing to those who do not, consequently the granting of the petition would annually bring \$25,000 more money into the State and furnish the white Agricultural College \$12,500 of which it is now deprived.

It is said the Governor is heartily in favor of the proposed plan and will recommend it to the General Assembly in his coming message.

State Encouragement of Fruit Raising.

Hon. Jno. T. Patrick, a member of the special committee for the State Horticultural Society, is out in a letter to the members of the next General Assembly, from which through the courtesy of Hon. Edw. Pull, Senator-elect from this district, we learn that at its coming session the State Legislature will be asked to make an appropriation for the encouragement of fruit raising.

This is a step in the right direction. Fruit growing is an important and remunerative employment that has as yet received from our people but a small part of the attention that it deserves. In addition to the benefit to the family from having an abundance of this luscious and healthful food in all its varieties, there is its value as a money crop which is great, the profits sometimes being enormous.

Quantities of fruit are now shipped North and good prices received for it. The demand for canned goods is on the increase. The canning industry is being rapidly developed, there are now over fifty factories in the State and the number is constantly being augmented, then there is a growing market both at home and for shipment and it is well to enact legislation that will have a tendency to make the industry develop more rapidly.

It is said that North Carolina has been giving less aid in this direction than any other State of the Union, owing to the fact that the farmers are not forward enough in asking for what they need and what is justly theirs, and consequently the matter has not heretofore been brought to the notice of the General Assembly with a respectful, urgent demand for favorable legislation on the subject.

It is proposed that the money appropriated for this purpose shall go to the farmers every year in the shape of premiums on fruit exhibited. Not a dollar of it is to be used in paying salaries or expenses.

The plan proposed is to offer liberal premiums and hold two fairs every year, one in August and one in October. The August fair to be held at different parts of the State—first in each Congressional district, then each section will get the advantage of the premiums. The fair to be held alternately, first in the mountains, then in the eastern portion, then the Southern, then the Northern portion of the State. Then the fair is to go to the other districts in the centre of the State. The fair is to be held each time in the town, village or township, offering the best advantage, but not to be held in any place twice. In this way every section will be interested, and the people get the advantage of it, and the money will go to the people evenly all over the State.

Manufacturers Coming to North Carolina.

Mr. C. J. Rhem, the superintendent of the State works at Weldon, who has been visiting his family in the city, returned to his field of labor yesterday. The State is cutting a canal nine miles long parallel with Roanoke river joining the portion of the river above the falls with that below so as to utilize advantageously the splendid water power it affords. A number of factories of various kinds in which great capitalists and prominent manufacturers of other States, such as Senator J. D. Cameron, of Pennsylvania, Hon. Wm. Mahone, of Virginia, and Arrington Bros., of Petersburg, Va., are largely interested. It is said that this water power after the completion of the work will rank about second best of those in the United States, and that lands in its vicinity have increased eight fold in value during the last few months. The South is now the place to make investments for profits, and it is destined soon to be the acknowledged seat of the manufacturing, agricultural, commercial and political power of the Union.

I hope there will be a goodly number of the brethren at Kitt Swamp Saturday before the third Sunday, for some arrangements ought to be made to secure a preacher for next year. Brethren, do not forget the time. There are many in Kitt Swamp who are anxious to do something. They want to go ahead; progress is their watchword. Let every brother and sister be on hand Saturday before third Sunday, and let those who are not there then quietly acquiesce in everything that is done, shoulder the part of the burden put on them. I learned from Bro. Alfred Gaskins that J. F. Sumrell, who is going to school here, preparing for the ministry, preached a very acceptable sermon for them last third Sunday. It has not been so I could visit many in the neighborhood at Kitt Swamp this year as I preached here at night the same day I preached over there. Alfred and Bryant Gaskins, and Asa Arthur all being on the road direct from New Berne to the church, always one or the other met me at the river and took me to the church. Whoever preaches for the church will find these three with many others, whose names to mention would require more space than I am entitled to, always ready to co-operate with him in every good work.

By the way, I forget to mention Alfred Gaskins in my report of the trip to Williamson. Having failed to get a horse as I expected, it being Union Meeting time in the neighborhood, Bro. Gaskins very kindly met me at the river, carried me to his house; the next day carried me to Vanceboro and on my return, sent to Vanceboro to meet me, brought back to his house, from whence Bryant Gaskins brought me to the river.
