The schooner Mattie E. Hiles, which sailed from here sometime ago for the West Indies with shingles, has been heard from. She was at Barbadoes on the 16th inst., where a load of molasses will be loaded for the homeward sail.

Last evening's mail train brought in about 250 passengers, among whom were Governor Fowle, State Auditor Sanderlin, and the Goldsboro Rifles, in charge of Capt. W. T. Dortch. The railroad and steamer brought in large crowds in the morning.

THE FAIR.

LARGE ATTENDANCE OF VISITORS.

The Art, Fancy Work and Calligraphy Departments Splendid Exhibits in All.

Yesterday we gave a general view of what was to be seen at the Fair. Let us now enter more into detail and notice and particularize on some of the articles in the different departments.

In the northern room on the upper floor is the Art department. When an admirer of the beautiful emeralds here is entranced by the scenes of loveliness on every hand that entice him to linger and gaze again and again from one object to another. Extending from door to door is a fine collection of portraits and drawings in charcoal, crayon, oil and water colors, all of which are the work of pupils of the New Berne Collegiate Institute. They are good enough to have been the work of experienced adults.

There is a handsome settee in the room the frame of which is made of New Berne lady from rhododendron roots gathered at Black Mountain and the lovely panels with its floral designs and flowers are painted by another of our New Berne ladies. Large and elegant tapestry paintings adorn the walls in several places. "Dawn," "Venus rising from the sea" and several others show artistic skill in a rare degree.

There are fine specimens of china painting, and neat wood carving. We notice also a pretty glass article, and numerous other articles that speak for their maker.

Mr. Edward Gerock makes a handsome display of photographs and some and pastel portraits.

Among the Fancy Work there is a charming variety of center pieces, doilies, splashes, sofa pillows, work quilts, etc. There is also an excellent hand-sewing and we see two pearly sofa pillows that are very attractive.

Miss Hattie Stanley of Raleigh, N. C., formerly of this city, exhibition a very center square. We are glad to see that New Bernians do not forget the old town even if they are living at a distance.

The crocheting exhibit is very fine, embracing almost everything in this line. There are five kinds of knitting by a lady 77 years old.

The Culinary department is handsomely decorated with charming evergreens, and otherwise made pleasant and attractive. This room is abundantly supplied with things that will make a hungry man's mouth water and yet many of them are wrought into such shapes of beauty that it would be with reluctance one would consent to see their symmetry destroyed even for so useful a purpose.

The iced cakes are covered with beautiful designs in net work, figures, and flowers. There is also a "pink tea table," the name of which is taken from the color of the principal articles upon it. The handsomest cake upon it represents the Fair. Over it is a flag bearing the words "East Carolina Fair, Oyster and Game Fair, 1891." The cake itself like the others is piquant, and it is covered with figures of game fish and oysters, these however are white.

The plain "stuff of life" is not forgotten. There are nice loaves of bread, and asprety biscuit and rolls as one would wish to see.

Placed on shelves in neat array are 65 jars of choice pickles, 70 of preserves, 40 of canned goods, and 50 glasses of jelly and they look delicious enough to tempt an epicure. On the same shelves are exhibits of scuppernon wine from one to twenty-three years old.

Rev. Edward Bull, the New Berne apriarist, has a table devoted to his use and has loaded it with samples of his fine comb honey, strained honey, honey vinegar and beeswax.
