WITH almost every town in North Carolina offering special inducements for manufactures, it is necessary for New Berne to put this locality upon an equality in that respect. To be on an equality there is to be far ahead in other directions.

THE special order, in the Legislature on yesterday, was the bill to extend the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad. We do not know what action was taken, but we do know that the defeat of the bill will be the triumph of the few over the many; the sacrifice of the State to the interest of mammoth corporations.

CRAVEN is no longer a Senatorial district, but with Jones, Carteret, Lenoir, Onslow and Greene, constitute the 8th. district that has two Senators. Craven extends cordial greetings to her sister counties and rejoices in the prospect of Democratic representation in the State Senate from this time on to the final consummation.

THERE will be at least four men in the Senate of the Fifty-second Congress to support the financial schemes of the Farmer's Alliance: Mr. Vance of North Carolina, Mr. Irby of South Carolina, Mr. Gordon of Georgia, and Mr. Pfeffer of Kansas.—N. Y. Sun.

Very true, but Vance, Irby and Gordon will fight under Democratic colors and stand to their posts until the day breaketh.

GOVERNOR HILL is showing his mettle. He has refused to recognize a requisition signed by Morgan G. Bulkeley, as Governor of Connecticut. The Governor said: If the people of Connecticut want the body of Fardon, they must ask it through Governor Morris. It is a piece of affrontery for Bulkeley to appear before the Legislature, and had I been in control, instead of making a speech, which he had no right to do, he would have been occupied in getting out. He holds possession of the Executive chamber today by force and by virtue of the Chandler and "Tom" Reed spirit of forcible usurpation.

WE, in common with the people of Eastern North Carolina generally, tender grateful thanks to the gentlemen of the press of this State for the very complimentary notices of the Fourth Annual Exposition of the East Carolina Fish, Oyster, Game and Industrial Association that have appeared in their columns. While the Exposition was richly entitled to the highest praise, the words of commendation, which have been and are to be spoken, will be enshrined in sacred memories, as commemorative of the generosity and nobility of the newspaper fraternity in the old North State.

THE FAIR.

Fish and Nets—Live Stock and Poultry Departments—Exhibits of Business Houses—Comments.

Among the special exhibits secured by Mr. Ives for his department were blocks of ice with fish frozen in them sent by the Crystal Ice Company of Elizabeth City. There were also gilling nets, hauling seines, fykes, and other apparatus used in fishing. These were furnished by the American Net and Twine Company to add to the interest of the Fair.

The live stock department showed up remarkably well in standard and thoroughbred horses, also in fine mules, jacks and ponies. The choicest breeds of cattle, sheep and goats were well represented by superior specimens of both full blood and grades.

The surpassing excellence of the poultry department in the number of breeds and the high quality of the fowls was a delightful surprise to poultry men and admirers of the feathered tribe. Of chickens there were bantams, games, frizzles, erminettes, Hamburgs, Wyandottes, Plymouth Rocks, Langshans, Cochins, etc.; white and bronze turkeys; Toulouse and Bremen geese; Pekin and other breeds of ducks, peafowls, etc. The massive Cochins, of both the buff, white and partridge varieties, and the Langshans are magnificent. The difference between them and the smaller breeds is strikingly shown in the exhibit made by Wood & Bro. of Riverview poultry yards. They have a coop with three divisions. The apartments at each end contain as fine, large buff Cochins as can be found, and the centre one has tiny Pekin bantams, and a wire tray suspended near the centre contains eggs of each breed. The contrast is remarkable. The breeder who makes the largest exhibit is Mr. W. H. Bray, proprietor of the Green Place poultry yards. He shows fourteen different breeds of turkeys, geese, ducks and chickens, all of the very finest quality. We do not believe any other one man in the State ever owned as fine a collection as this before.

Visitors at the Fair from the New England States, and one who is familiar with the poultry industry in Illinois and Indiana—localities in which it has reached a high grade of development—state that while they have seen greater numbers of fowls at the large poultry shows in those States, they have never seen those at this Fair surpassed in quality anywhere.

Several of our prominent business men made displays of merchandise that they handle. One would think it difficult to make an exhibit out of groceries that would be pleasing to the eye among so many beautiful things, but Mr. E. B. Hackburn solved the difficulty and made one that was a delight to behold.

Messrs. L. H. Cutler & Co. made a splendid exhibit of fine crockery that attracted much attention on account of its own beauty and the taste displayed in its arrangement.

Mr. John Suter filled the space allotted to him with elegant furniture.

Messrs. Barrington & Baxter made the largest display of ready-made clothing and gent's furnishing goods ever made at the Fair and their fine quality showed that these gentlemen are not lacking in taste in selecting their stock.

Messrs. Clark & Co. exhibited ready-made clothing and many little specialties in the dry goods line which they handle. A portion of their ready-made clothing was of their own manufacture.

The Rolan Baking Powder Co., of Baltimore, made a nice exhibit of their brands of goods which are extensively handled by a number of dealers in this city.

There was an exhibit of fine buggies on the ground from the Kinston factory.

Mr. Joe K. Willis made a handsome exhibit of monuments etc., from the East Carolina Marble Works.

We feel our inability to do justice to the merits of this Fair. Competent critics are emphatic in pronouncing it the best that ever was held in the State, and those who attended the great Fairs North say that though they have large ones that they have never seen one that showed so many of the resources of a section as completely, attractively and satisfactorily as this one did. Whether you attended this one or not, come to the next one and see for yourself what a glorious section of our country we live in, and what a magnificent Fair we have. It is one that the entire State should be proud of and participate in.

The Golden Link and Star bands—the two colored bands of this city, which competed for the premium offered for the best brass band, were faithful in furnishing music whenever it was needed. The 1st premium, \$100 was awarded to the Golden Link band. The playing of the two bands was so near equal that the Fair Association decided to combine the second premium, \$50, and the third premium, \$25, and award both—a total of \$75—to the Star band.

Store Burned.

Yesterday about noon parties on the street discovered flames issuing through the roof of Mr. L. J. Taylor's store at the Frog Pond and gave the alarm, but for some unaccountable reason the alarm was slow in reaching down town consequently by the time the bell rang and the fire department reached the spot the building was enveloped in flames and soon burned down. It was valued at \$1,000 and insured in the Hamburg & Bremen Insurance Company for \$600. A portion of the stock of groceries and liquors was saved. The loss on it amounted to \$1,000. It was insured for \$300.

The fire caught in some way in the rented apartments in the upper story near where the stove-pipe entered the flue, and had gotten well under way before discovered and burned rapidly.

Yesterday was the last day of the fourth successful exposition of the East Carolina Fish, Oyster, Game and Industrial Association. It does us good today to behold what magnificent proportions the "New Berne Fair" of 1888 has developed into. About five years ago the NEW BERNE JOURNAL and a few leading men of the city put the ball in motion. Not immediately, but soon, the idea of having annual exhibitions of the resources of the East gained favor among the people, and the unflinching zeal of the originators seemed gradually to take hold of the leading men of all classes, and the noble women, until now the people of this section are as one for the success of the Fair.
