THE North Carolina Tobacco Convention, J. S. Carr, of Durham, President, is to meet at Henderson on the 18th inst.

So far 422 bodies have been recovered from the wreck of the immigrant steamship Utopia in Gibraltar Bay.

By order of Mayor Grant the electric light and other wires and poles are being cut down and removed from certain sections of New York.

It is very pertinently suggested that while the Italian government is in the recalling business it should recall the Mafia.—News and Observer.

WINSTON is pushing the work of constructing its elaborate sewerage system. The Sentinel says 9,000 feet of sewer pipe, of the 20,000 feet in the contract is already down.

THE Wilmington Messenger says that in the first three months of the year there were ninety-three railroad companies chartered in the South. This has a business like aspect.

THE cutlery imports from Sheffield fell off to the amount of \$27,000 for the last quarter as compared with the same period of last year—a decrease of over fifty per cent. This result is attributed to the new tariff law.

THE Republican party in North Carolina can never succeed while battling for the right of the people to control county affairs by electing county officers. And this is because the white people will not consent to a form of county government which will involve certain counties in a possibility of being controlled by negroes.—Greensboro North State.

LATTERLY we have not seen the Raleigh papers. The newspaper "fiend" takes them off before we can get a glimpse.—Wilmington Messenger. No one who has not experienced it knows the annoyance it gives an editor to have exchanges taken from the office. The "newspaper fiend" is a provoker of profanity, and ought to be suppressed.

MORE is to be expected in the course of time from the growth of our white population, undiminished by emigration, than from immigration, however enormous it may become, or with whatever amount of accumulated wealth it may be accompanied. This old Commonwealth, which is now no longer losing its most energetic and enterprising spirits, but instead is receiving a notable addition from outside, has an economic career before it which will be marked by unexampled distinction and splendor.

Annual Meeting of the Stock Holders of the Fair Association.

The annual meeting of the stock holders of the E. C. F. O. G. & I. Association was held Friday night at the Y. M. C. A. Hall.

There was a good representation of our leading citizens present and they showed a strong appreciation of the management and splendid results of the Fair just closed. In evidence of the fact the present incumbents, Messrs Wm. Dunn and Chas. Reizenstein, were enthusiastically re-elected President, and Sec. and Treas. the fourth term to those positions. EARTHQUAKE.

Severe Shocks at Quebec and Along the St. Lawrence.

QUEBEC, April 2.—Last evening a violent earthquake was felt here and all along the north shore of the St. Lawrence and extended far into the back country. News from St. Gabriel county, Quebec, and other stations confirm the fact of the violent shock. Residents of Beaufort state that the earth and dwellings there shook in that parish for several seconds and caused the inhabitants great alarm.

IMMIGRATION.

Italy Leading All Other Countries in the Numbers Landing at New York.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Superintendent of Immigration Weber says the immigration from Italy is rapidly increasing, and in fact is leading that of all other countries. The figures of March are: Italy, 7,869; Germany, 7,087; Great Britain and Ireland, 4,890; Hungary, 3,589; Austria, 3,454, and Russia, 2,925. Total 39,393.

Sixteen hundred and seven Italians were landed at the Barge office to-day.
