LYNCHING is bad under any circumstances, it is especially bad when it is done with the connivance of those in authority. Soldiers of the United States garrison at Walla Walla, Washington, took a prisoner from the jail at that place and riddled him with bullets.

A LOUISVILLE, Ky., dispatch of April 25th says: "Hume Clay, one of the descendants of Henry Clay, Kentucky's noted Statesman, pleaded guilty yesterday of forging his grandfather's name to documents upon which he realized \$90,000. He was sentenced to 8 years in the penitentiary."

## LOCAL NEWS.

**COTTON.**—New Berne Market.—Sales 12 bales at 7 to 8 3/5.

Sunday morning Rev. R. A. Ricks, Christian minister of Burlington, fell dead from a stroke of apoplexy just after commencing his sermon before a large congregation in the Methodist church at that place.

The dispatch yesterday morning from G. S. Palmer, New York, quotes the market firm on peas: choice cabbages \$1.25 to \$1.75; asparagus \$1.50 to \$3.00. In the afternoon T. H. Kepner & Co., of Baltimore, wired peas \$3.00 to \$3.50, and berries at 30 cts.

New mail routes have been established from New Berne to the places mentioned below with the following schedule: Bellair (Richardson place): Arrives Tuesday and Friday at 9 a. m.; Canary (J. N. Whitford's Mill): Arrives Saturday at 12 m., and leaves same day at 3 p. m.; Winthrop (Abe Lee's mill) leaves Monday and Thursday at 6 p. m. and returns that afternoon at 6 p. m.

In the society contests at the State University a short time since, Mr. W. P. Wooten, son of Mr. S. I. Wooten, a prominent Lenoir county farmer, won the Declamers medal. This is Mr. Wooten's first year at the University and such an achievement as this is one of which the young man has a right to be proud, and which we trust is but a harbinger of future successes that await him in life.

United States Court, Eastern District, convened yesterday, Judge Seymour presiding, and District Attorney Cook, and Marshal Hill at their post. Only one case was tried, that of U. S. Mace for violation of the postal laws. The defendant was represented by Messrs. M. DeW. Stevenson and L. J. Moore. The case was given the jury in the afternoon and resulted in an acquittal.

For some time before the departure of the steamer New Berne, of the O. D. line, yesterday there was a tremendous rush of peas both by land and water to the wharf for shipment. Never did they come to a boat or train faster. It was an interesting sight to watch the bustle and hurry prevailing. The New Berne departed loaded to her utmost capacity and there were still between five hundred and a thousand boxes that the shippers turned over to the railroad that were designed for the steamer. The truck train carried off a good shipment from New Berne and received many others along the line of the road.

**The Funeral of Major Hearne.**

The funeral services of Maj. Wm. A. Hearne was held from Christ Church yesterday morning, Rev. T. M. N. George officiating, and the following gentlemen acting as pall-bearers: Messrs. E. E. Harper, K. R. Jones, C. E. Foy; Geo. H. Roberts, W. F. Roundtree, W. B. Boyd, E. H. Meadows and D. T. Carraway.  
Major Hearne's lamented death leaves a vacancy in the ranks of journalism that will be hard to fill. He was a writer who had the welfare of this, his native State at heart, especially the eastern portion of it, and his strongest efforts were directed to securing those things that would further its prosperity and development. We call attention to the article we give this morning that speaks of him more fully.

**City Improvements and Laboring Men**

Our steamer wharves and railroad freight warehouse present scenes of great activity as they are receiving the large quantities of truck that are now being shipped from here. The pea fields are thronged with hundreds of laborers busily engaged in picking that crop. We wish these busy times could prevail throughout the year, and the construction of the city improvements will help in that direction. It is estimated that the work on them and the new public building will furnish employment on an average to two hundred and fifty men about a year. Laboring men, reflect on this. The regular work going on in the city is sufficient to furnish you a living but not enough to keep you constantly engaged, nor are the wages high. Now, if in addition to the regular work going on special employment is provided for two hundred and fifty men, do you not see how much more demand there will be for the services of those left and what better opportunity they will have for obtaining steady work and better pay. Carrying the election for improvements will put money in the pockets of the working people and our business men will feel the effects of the increased expenditures they will be enabled to make.

## THE DEATH OF MAJ. W. A. HEARNE.

A Veteran Journalist Whose Great Desire and Efforts were for the Uplifting of North Carolina.

In the death of Major Hearne North Carolina loses one of its best informed editors and by far the ablest newspaper writer in the State.

It was not the fortune of the writer to have known the deceased in the earlier days of his manhood, but from an acquaintance of a quarter of a century and a close observation of his career in that time, could but conceive a high estimate of his abilities as a writer and his wonderful store of information.

For journalism he had a passion that knew no abatement by unfortunate enterprises or disappointed hopes, and whenever any other occupation was undertaken he would instinctively turn towards the editorial rooms as a recreation as much as for profit.

Major Hearne was a man of amiable temper and equanimous disposition. He seldom displayed passion in either writing or talking, but always exhibited a profound knowledge of his subject in either.

It is not the purpose of the present writing to give even an epitome of his biography, or to follow him through the vicissitudes of the war or recount the many adventures in which he was from time to time engaged, but it is the humble belief of the writer that while "it is not for mortals to command success, he did more, deserved it."

He has crossed the river, and let us join in the hope that his reward may be that of eternal rest.

## Onslow County Items.

Fine weather for farming now, and the farmers are making use of it, some are done planting cotton and chopping out the same. Corn looks well.

Mr. A. J. Aman is a model farmer. Everything around him looks like clock-work, and the finest garden we reckon in the county. Cabbages, onions, beans, tomatoes and collards in abundance. We measured a cabbage across the top that measured 30 inches. These were sowed last fall.

## FRATRICIDE NEAR WADESBORO.

Two Brothers Quarrel Over a Trace Chain, and One Kills the Other.

WADESBORO, N. C. April 25.—Thos. Ricketts, a white man who lived near the South Carolina line, about thirteen miles south of Wadesboro, was killed by his brother, Calvin Ricketts, Thursday evening. They were disputing about two feet of common trace chain, each claiming the chain to be his. A fight ensued when Calvin seized a board and struck Thomas two licks, one on the back and the other on the head. When the lick upon the head was struck Thomas fell to the ground with his skull broken.

His mother was present and tried to get Calvin to help her carry Thomas into the house, but he refused to do so and went about his plowing. The mother managed to get Thomas into the house where he lived a few hours and expired.

Calvin was brought here last night and placed in jail.

## BLOODY WORK OF CHILIAN TROOPS.

The Revolutionists Defeat the Government's Troops Again.

New York, April 25.—The Herald has Callao, Peru, advices this a. m., dated March 31, giving latest news from Chili. It contains the details of the slaughter of defenceless workmen by government troops at Pozo Almonte. The workmen were engaged on the nitrate beds near which both armies were concentrating. Provisions were running short and the workmen on the morning of the 4th sent a committee to the works at Negreiros to collect the men there.

A train full of government troops appeared and halted beside the place where the men were gathered. Then, without the slightest warning, these troops opened fire on the 900 defenceless workmen, women and children. Shortly afterward the forces marched forward and killed all the men.

On the 7th instant a terrible battle was fought between government troops and the revolutionists at Pozo Almonte in which the former were defeated and completely routed, 5,000 men were engaged and the losses were very heavy. It being estimated 500 of the government force and that 800 of the rebels were killed and wounded. The government forces in retiring on Caminas shot all the prisoners they had and destroyed all the nitrate establishments they passed.

The revolutionary squadron has left Siquie for Valparaiso. The object is to attack that place. Twenty-two war ships and transports compose the fleet.

## Political Sensation in Arkansas—Election Officers Indicted in Federal Courts.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 25.—The United States grand jury yesterday indicted all the judges and clerks who served at the recent election at Morrilton, Conway county. They are charged with stuffing the ballot box and falsifying the returns. The indictment are all of prominent merchants and leading citizens. The matter may develop into a political sensation of national interest.
