## NEW RIVER ITEMS.

The oyster industry is still on the boom. Nearly every one who has not a garden is trying to get one. One man entered one a few months ago, at about \$12, and in a few weeks sold it for \$150, when he thought he was doing well; but the man to whom he sold it, got \$400, in about a month afterward.

The price of oyster gardens vary from \$100, and even more. The people have planted more oysters than usual this spring. Lewis Morris W. N. Marine, E. S. Smith, U. G. Canady, D. L. Grant, David Canady, J. A. Mattocks and Cap John Hill, are our largest oyster growers, while the New River Oyster Company, under the Superintendance of Mr. L. M. Landen, are planting a large area in Sotn's Bay. Mr. E. S. Smith picked up a piece of plank the other day in his garden, which had forty eight live oysters on it. This shows how prolific the waters of New River are. It is estimated that 3,000 bushels can be planted on one acre, and two at a cost of not more than ten cents a bushel, when in two or three years they can be taken up and sold from 15cts to \$1' per bushel.

There will be a big banks party on the east side of New River banks on the full moon in June. They will arrive at the banks on Monday evening 22nd inst at 9 o'clock, in time to see the moon rise, and remain all night. Bring along your tents and baskets. A large crowd is expected.

There will be a big Alliance picnic and public speaking at New River Academy near Sneeds Ferry on the 3rd Saturday in June. H. E. King and other prominent Alliance men will be there. Every body is invited to come and enjoy such a big time as the good people of Stump Sound usually have on such occasions.

Col. W. D. Harrison of Swansboro' was down here a few days ago. We understand that he is two interested in the oyster grounds of New River, and has been offered a very large percentage on the money invested, for his interest.

## Cold Waves.

Cold waves are those sudden changes from high to very low temperature which constitute the most noteworthy feature of winter weather in the United States. They are produced by the flow of masses of cold, dry air from the regions East of the Rocky Mountains in British America, towards the south or southeast. During the long winter nights of the Arctic regions dry, clear air accumulates in deep layers which is cooled by radiation to a temperature many degrees below zero; and then commences to flow towards any place where warm air is ascending, as it does in the low pressure areas or storms which constantly pass from west to east across the United States.

A "low" is produced by the air somewhere becoming heated from unknown causes, above the surrounding atmosphere. This excessively heated air ascends and air is drawn in below from all sides to replace it. That drawn in on the south to east side is warm and moist; that drawn from the north to west side is dry and cold. The cold wave follows after the low area as it moves eastward.

The severer and prolonged cold waves are associated with extensive areas of high pressure. Their rate of progress averages eight hundred miles in twenty-four hours. It is of great advantage to many business and agricultural interest to know in advance when the temperature will fall quickly and decidedly, besides affecting the comfort and health of thousands of people.

## EDITORS IN THE CHAIN GANG.

CITY OF MEXICO, June 15.—A telegram from Guatemala states that the President has caused the imprisonment of Nicolas Cifuentes, Manuel Alfaro and Ventura Paz, who were the editors of El Popular, of Gueatemala, one of the principal towns in the upper districts of Guatemala. By his orders they were chained and thrown into prison, and are made to sweep the streets with ball and chain locked to their feet carry heavy stones and do other degrading work.

It appears that they published an article in their paper under the heading of "Thieves Authorized and Unauthorized," which attacked the quasi-Government of Barillas. At once their office was seized and the editors were cast into prison. The incident has caused marked indignation, and the feeling against Barillas has increased intensely. The revolutionary talk is stronger than ever over this outrage.

CITY OF MEXICO, June 13.—The chief cause for the revolutionary spirit now existing in Guatemala is said to be the desire of President Barillas to have Francisco Aguiano who resigned from the Cabinet a few days ago, succeed him. The latter is thoroughly hated by the people, and they object to Barillas forcing him on them.

## More Chinese Outrages Attacks on Christian Missions.

LONDON, June 15.—Dispatches from Shanghai announce fresh excesses upon the part of the anti-European element in the population of China. Attacks upon Christian missions in the interior continue. In one case the Chinese troops sent to repress the rioters aided them and made matters still worse.

More serious rioting has occurred at Takatang, where the lady missionaries were compelled to flee for their lives. The ladies arrived at Kin-kiang, one of the treaty ports on the Yang-tse Kiang river. There is a great excitement among the Chinese in the vicinity of Lake Poyang, near Kin-kiang. Several missionary establishments have been looted and burned by the riotous Chinese.

## 60 DEAD, 200 INJURED.

## An Excursion Train Plunges Through a Bridge Into the River.

BERNE, June 14.—A most horrible accident occurred on the Mauchen Stein and Bale Railway to day through the collapse of a heavily loaded excursion train. The train was crowded with people on the way to attend a musical fete. Sixty persons were killed outright, and 200 were injured. Two engines and the first car plunged into the river, and all the passengers in the cars were drowned. Two cars remained suspended from the bridge. All the trainmen were killed. Thirteen cars were saved.

LONDON, June 13.—It is rumored to-day that Parnell's marriage with Mrs. O'Shea will take place the coming week. Parnell has subsided somewhat of late, the reason being that he is spending nearly all his spare time in the company of Mrs. O'Shea. The daughters, however, adhere to their father, contrary to the prevalent impression, and will, it is stated, have no more to do with their mother after the marriage.
