The Trucking Interest Around New bern, N. C.

The present truck season which is now about to close has been an extraordinary one. The quantity of truck which has been produced has been enormous. In regard to the quantity, during the shipping season the railroad and two steamships have been taxed to the utmost of their capacity to move it. The railroad company has run from one to three trains daily, carrying from three to four thousand barrels and boxes each train, the steamer "Neuse" has made three trips per week carrying from four to four thousand five hundred barrels and boxes each trip, the steamer "Newberne" has made two trips each week carrying from two thousand to two thousand five hundred
