Line of the N. W. & C. Railroad. A. B. Morton, vice-president of the Cincinnati and Ope Fear Railroad, has recorded in Berkeley county, S. C., a mortgage for \$9,000,000 on the property of that road. The project is said to be to run a road from Norfolk to Charleston east of the Adams Coast Line, entering Charleston on a bridge across the Cooper river, crossing Ashley river and going down to Savannah. The company now controls a line from Southport to Conway, S. C. From there the road will be extended via Georgetown to Charleston. The company has purchased the franchise of the Pleasant and Little Run railroad, with all the necessary land grants.—Norfolk Virginian.

JACKSONVILLE ITEMS.

Grand Picnic—The Railroad—Excursionists—Accident—Jacksonville Booming—A Board of Health.

Heavy rains and deep creeks. Our annual picnic at Alum Springs was quite a success. Sheriff Murrill employed the Wilmington brass band for the occasion, and they gave us all the music we had been looking for. The crowd was estimated to be 2,500.

Our town is still on a boom. New houses are going up, and the Oastlow Lumber Company will put in larger machinery in their mill—machinery that will cut one hundred thousand feet per day.

Jacksonville is developing fast, and ere many years roll by it will be one of the leading towns of Eastern North Carolina.

The grading on the railroad is rapidly being pushed on towards New Berne. Our coroner held an inquest over the body of Tom Williams today; a post mortem examination was made by Dr. E. L. Cox; he found ball lodged in back part of brain. The ball entered the head just above the eye and went on entirely through the brain. The boy lived three weeks after the accident.

Jacksonville is headquarters for excursions during the season. Several hundred colored excursionists were out here last Monday, and when ready to return and while the train was in motion one of the intoxicated group fell from the train and hit one of the cut just above the ankle, and the other crushed at the ankle. He was taken to Wilmington and amputation performed. Last news was that he was dead.

The physicians of this county desire to form a board of health, and the physicians, Chairman of Board of Commissioners, Surveyor, and Mayor of Jacksonville are in a quest to meet at the court house on the first Monday in September, 1891.
