As far as Col. Polk's friends are concerned, they are not willing for him to be a candidate for governor, as they do not propose that he shall step down from the presidency of the National Alliance. His best friends in North Carolina would rather see him in that place than in any political office. It appears very probable from what can be gathered that he will be re-elected. The election will be held in September.—Raleigh Correspondent Charlotte Chronicle.

A SERIOUS state of political affairs exists in China, and the combined fleets of the Powers may be called upon at any moment to take effective action. Great excitement prevails at the increasing tension between the authorities and the foreign ministers. The former are obstinate in their refusal to redress the injury done to foreigners during the recent riots. There is no reason to doubt that if the authorities do not yield, concerted action by the combined war vessels is imminent. It is known that the foreign ministers have been compelled to inform the Chinese Government that a joint naval demonstration of an effective nature, in which the France, American, British and German squadrons will take part, will be ordered in the near future, unless speedy reparation is made for the injuries and abuses complained of by the ministers of the Powers.

LOCAL NEWS.

NEW ADVERTISEMENTS. Howard—Good things, etc. Smallwood & Slover—Stoves, etc.

Sixteen fire companies have up to date entered for the various events at the State tournament at Durham. Yesterday Mr. Thos. Howard moved a building down close to his marine railways to be fitted up for his office.

Today at 12 m. is the time for the sale of the houses on the lots destined for the sites of the United States public building and the Episcopal rectory.

A thirteen year old boy was placed in the penitentiary Wednesday to serve a seven years' sentence for highway robbery in Orange county. He is the youngest convict ever sentenced for that offense in North Carolina.

At Raleigh the work of extensive decorations and paintings of the buildings at the exposition grounds has begun preparatory to the great exposition, which will begin October 1st. Well-known artists and decorators have been employed to do the work.

Mr. C. J. Scheelky has a force of hands at work doing the grading for the switch which the A. and N. C. Railroad is to build to his planing mill. It will be a double switch—one end going to the dry kiln and the other to the storage shed.

It is rumored that W. Duke, of Durham, who donated almost the entire fund with which the new Trinity College building was constructed there, has signified his intention to make another handsome donation to repair the damage caused by the falling in of the tower.

Among the minor improvements going on we notice that Mr. L. S. Wood is painting the front of his hardware store a light gray. It is pleasing to see buildings of any character kept nicely painted. In comparison with their cost nothing adds more to the attractiveness of their appearance.

The large elegant crayon group portrait of all the sons of the late Judge C. R. Thomas, which is on exhibition at Mr. J. Suter's furniture store, attracts a great deal of attention. It was drawn by Mr. Nace Brook, who is engaged at Mr. Ed. Gerock's. The figures are very natural and life-like; the work is finely executed and reflects credit upon the talented artist.

The premium list of the Thirty-first Annual North Carolina State Fair is a neat little book of 112 pages. The Fair will be held in Raleigh, October 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th, during and in connection with the Southern Inter-State Exposition. It is announced that the Fair and Exposition combined will present an exhibition that has never been surpassed in the South in merit, variety and the arrangement of its several departments.

Sam Idlet and Jacob Grimes, two colored men from James City, informs us that some person or persons entered the field of Idlet Wednesday night and mashed up a large lot of water melons and cut down a great quantity of his corn. Also during the night Grimes, a ferryman between James City and New Bern, had his boat stolen. They feel very much outraged at such treatment and attribute it to their having been witnesses for Bryan in the James City case.

The N. C. State Fireman's Association will meet in Durham next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. All delegates are expected to be on hand by 10 a. m. on the 25th inst. as that day will be for the transaction of Association business only. Each company is entitled to two delegates. The next two days will be tournament days and Secretary J. W. Griffith says all the companies that come must be in Durham by 10 o'clock on the morning of the 26th in order to take part in the parade. The New Bern Steam Fire Engine Company expects to be there.

Rev. R. G. Pearson in Ill Health.

Rev. R. G. Pearson, the noted evangelist who held a very successful series of meetings in New Bern a few years ago, has been advised by his physicians to stop work for a year on account of his health which has not been good for nearly a year. Mr. Pearson, in a letter published in the Wilmington Messenger this announces how he will use the time:

"I, with my wife, will on September 5th, sail from New York for Europe and the Holy Land. We will spend October in the Holy Land, will visit Greece, Egypt and Italy, will spend most of the winter in London and Paris; the spring in Germany and the summer in Switzerland and Scotland, returning after a year's absence. My address will be Rev. R. G. Pearson, care of E. M. Jenkins, Queen's Court Hotel, Palestine party, London, England."

High Praise for a Young Minister.

Our townsman, Rev. Jas. Thomas, who has been in charge of the Presbyterian church at Rocky Mount during the summer, exchanged pulpits with Rev. McArn. of Wilson, last Sunday, and the Wilson Mirror says he preached two highly entertaining and very enjoyable sermons and made a most favorable impression upon all who heard him. His voice "lacks richness and volume, yet it is delightfully flexible, and felicitously responsive to all the exacting requirements of the varying emotions of the heart, and thrills one with the fervid glowings of its dramatic passion.

In several instances his utterances approximated the thrilling realm of a burning oratory, and came so near as to make us feel the electrifying outbreak of his glowing fire. His manner of delivery is very engaging and fascinating, and interest in his discourse is never allowed to lag for a single minute. His language, while not rich with the alluring embellishments of rhetorical elegance and splendor, or resonant with the sonorous flow of rhythmic grace and poetic beauty, is clear and pure and chaste and smooth, and flows radiantly along with no grammatical impediments or impure sediments to break or soil the grace and purity of its pellucid ripples.

He is undoubtedly a man of brains and talent and culture, and in the two sermons he preached on Sunday we saw the bursting buds of those fine flowers of ministerial effort, which will, when full blossomed and in richest bloom, distill a fragrance that will redound to the glory of God, and to the salvation of sinners.

WILSON'S MILLS.

Among the Hills—Good Land—Extensive Lumber Business—Crop Prospects—Revival in the Church of Christ—Pleasant People.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—I am twenty three miles east of Raleigh, on the R. and D. Railroad, in the beginning of the hill country. The soil, though quite rocky in places, is adapted to a variety of crops, and some of the land yields two bales of cotton to the acre. Corn is raised in an abundance on some of the lands. It has been said by some that there are as fine tobacco lands in this community as there are in any other section of the State.

In a short distance of this place there is plenty of iron ore, over 60 per cent iron and some say greater than that. Silver and gold also, I think, have been found in a mile or so of the place, and with the proper amount of capital invested, backed by the requisite degree of energy and public spirit, this place could be made, indeed, a garden spot.

There is only one town here; they are engaged in the manufacture of lumber, in farming and merchandising, and they are also contractors. They put everything right here in their shop, put it on the cars and send it to the place it is to be put up, ready to put in place. They do business from the coast to the western part of the State. They cut their own lumber, mold it with their own machines, and can, therefore, do work as reasonable as anybody. William Wilson, John Wilson, Charles Wilson, George Uzzell are four of the firm. It is wonderful to see how smoothly they carry their business, each having his part to perform and on business goes like clock work. They are filling a bill now for a \$11,000 set of stables; will that do for a horse house? I have been told that the firm works over a hundred and fifty hands in the business. The prospect for the farmers in this immediate section is not so good as it was last year. The superabundance of rain seems to have injured the corn and cotton somewhat, though crops are very fair.

The meeting that began here the 6th inst. is going on yet with increased interest. To date there have been eleven confessions. The meeting will close in a few days. Bro. J. Harper, the pastor of the church, is with me in the meeting and has rendered *important help*. He has been preaching about eighteen years for the church at this place, and is loved by all. While he has been preaching for the church so long, he still knows the people, which is indubitable evidence that he is not yet a grown man. He ought to be where he could devote all his time to preaching—that ought to be his entire work.

Our stay among this people has been indeed a pleasant one. Their kindness and broad hospitality will reach the heart of any man.
