Discoway will now put up a nice residence for himself on the lot made vacant by the removal.

At Pantego, Sunday afternoon, Mr. G. L. Swindell's barn and stables which were built together were struck by lightning and burned, together with the contents of the barn. The loss was some seven or eight hundred dollars. A horse in the stable was killed, but a colt in the same stable was not hurt.

Mr. C. K. Bell, formerly of Wildwood, died at his home in Hogwood, Halifax county, Monday, the 17th inst., of malarial fever, aged 82 years. His remains, accompanied by Mr. R. J. Shields, proprietor of the Hogwood Hotel, passed through last night en route to his old home at Wildwood for interment. For the last two years of his life Mr. Bell was telegraph operator and express agent at Hogwood. He leaves a wife and child.

**Craven vs. Pamlico.**

In the case of the Board of Commissioners of Craven against the Board of Commissioners of Pamlico, W. R. Allen, Esq., the referee to whom the case was referred to find the law and facts, has just filed his report in Lenoir county Superior Court, which is in session this week. The referee finds in his report that Pamlico owes Craven county the sum of \$5,954 87, instead of about \$50,000, for which Craven was contending. However, this does not finally decide the matter. Either side has sixty days to file exceptions to the report. Messrs. F. M. Simmons and C. R. Thomas represented Craven, and W. T. Caho and M. DeW. Stevenson represented Pamlico.

**Dangerously Wounded.**

Two colored men, Aaron Lewis, from Washington, and Alonzo Moore, from South River, had a dispute at the foot of Hancock street Tuesday night about 2 o'clock and as Moore was starting away Lewis came after him and without warning of his intention attacked and cut him dangerously about his body.

Lewis escaped at the time, but upon a search being made on the steamer Alpha which brought a party of excursionists over to attend the Fair he was discovered by policeman Land stowed away in a secluded part of the hold and arrested.

Upon the statement of Dr. R. S. Primrose, who attended the wounded man, that it would be several days before it could be determined how the case would terminate and that it might end fatally. S. R. Street, Esq., postponed the trial until September 1st, (next Tuesday) at 3 p. m., and placed Lewis' bail for appearance at that time at \$500. Being unable to give it he was sent to jail.

**Tobacco Raising a Success in Craven.**

Messrs. E. H. & J. A. Meadows sent a sample of tobacco raised by Messrs. Hackburn & Willett at their celebrated Oaks farm, 34 miles from this city, to Henderson to get the opinion of the tobacco growers of that section. They are in receipt of a letter in reference to it which states that all who have seen it pronounce it equal to the Nash county grown tobacco. To grasp the force of this comparison it must be remembered that no State excels North Carolina in raising the finer varieties of tobacco and we are further informed that heretofore it has been an admitted fact that Nash county raised the best in the State.

Several counties near Craven—Lenoir, Greene, Pitt and Wilson have been for several years profitably engaged in tobacco culture and yearly increasing the acreage, and this year Messrs. Hackburn & Willett put in 8 acres of the Orinoco, Havana, Flanagan and Good varieties as a test of what it would do here. They have already cured one barn of it and are now curing two more and have several others still to cure. They are abundantly satisfied with the results.

This is but another proof of the wonderful adaptability of our soil to whatever crop it is devoted and it paves the way for a farther diversification of products (which is the true road to prosperity) by the introduction in our midst of another greatly remunerative money crop.

## The Colored Fair.

Though there was rain yesterday morning, as it cleared off a good crowd assembled at the Fair grounds, there being an increase over the previous day's attendance. A number of visitors came in on excursions from Washington, Elizabeth City and by the Atlantic and N. C. Railroad from both ends of the line. Other exhibits were also added to those already at the Fair.

A baseball game was played in the afternoon between the Mutuals of Wilmington and the Athletics of New Bern, the former coming out victorious.

Later in the afternoon horse racing, a feature which adds much interest to such occasions, took place. There were both trotting and running races which will be continued today.

As the rain prevented the Fair parade on the streets yesterday it will take place today at 9:30, a. m. There will be a baseball game at the grounds at 11 a. m. between the Island City of Greenville and the Winston Giants, and at 2 p. m. the winner of the morning game will play the Mutuals who won the game yesterday afternoon. The horse racing will begin at 5 p. m., and there will be speaking at night by Rev. J. C. Price.

## Opening of the University.

The University will open September 31. A very large increase is expected. Three new professors and four assistant professors have been elected since June. The gymnasium director will add boxing and fencing to the physical culture. Dr. Whitehead will examine each student as he enters and prescribe the physical training needed to develop his body and health to perfect proportions. The chapel has been remodeled. Prayer will be compulsory. A trained choir and an organ will add to the attractions.

Ten Canceron scholarships and twenty alumni scholarships have been established. Five \$200 fellowships will help educate bright college graduates. The repairs are nearly complete and the South building looks like new.

Arrangements are now making for baths in the old East. The University is decidedly getting upward rise.
