Watch Thief Captured. Yesterday afternoon Mayor Ellis found and captured Henry Hollis, a colored man charged with stealing a \$125 gold watch Monday night at Morehead from Mr. W. H. Barhea, of Marion, S. C., it is supposed by picking his pocket while on the way from the train to the boat to cross over to Beaufort. It was found that Hollis had the watch by his offering to sell it at Morehead before leaving there. A description of him and the watch was furnished the city authorities here and Friday they found that another colored man, Ellis Pearce, had the watch trying to sell it and with his aid Hollis was detected and secured. Pearce had been a waiter at the Atlantic Hotel but has been in New Bern for seven weeks. It appears that he undertook to sell the watch for Hollis on the strength of an acquaintance formed with him while down there. The trial will come off to-morrow morning. The Railroad Wreck. It is believed that all bodies have been recovered from the wreck on the W. N. C. R. R. The total dead number twenty-two and the injured twenty-six. A thorough investigation is being made with the aim of locating the cause and responsibility of the disaster. The dead in addition to yesterday's report: Chas. G. Webber, Pittsburg, Pa.; Mrs. Frank H. White, Memphis, Tenn.; Henry Patterson (col); an unknown white man with a ticket reading from Reidsville, N. C. to Corinth, Miss., and supposed from the name in the testament on his person to be one A. L. Bingham. Injured not stated: Will Bradford and Marshall Nix, Asheville; Benj. Smith, Reidsville; Col. H. C. Demming, Harrisburg, Pa.; C. A. Bally, Danville, Va.; Andrew Gwyn, (col.); Sam Dobbin, (col.); J. M. Brown, Sallabury; Samuel Carter, Asheville; J. E. Holler, Crossing, Catawba county. Only two are un-injured. Col. Beushan Cameron and Mr. Elliott of Hickory. Miss Opheleia Polk Moore, of Helena, Ark., was killed, and her mother, Mrs. H. E. Moore, was badly injured. It is stated that Mrs. Moore was the niece of President James K. Polk and the widow of Maj. W. E. Moore, formerly United States Marshal, and afterwards Senator in Nebraska, and later Chief Commissary of the Confederate army in the West under General Albert Sidney Johnston. Announcing the Surrender of the Insurgent Forces--Denials from Congressional Sources. Senator Lozano, the Chilian minister at Washington, yesterday received a cablegram dated Valparaiso, the 28th, from M. M. Aldunate, the minister of foreign affairs, saying that on the 25th the insurgent army was completely defeated in Vina del Mar. A division of the Chilian government army cut off their retreat to the ships and obliged them to surrender unconditionally. PARIS, Aug. 27.--The confidential agent of the provisional government in Chili denies that Balmaceda has been victorious. The agent says that he has received a telegram from Iquique, and another from Buenos Ayres, stating that Balmaceda had been defeated. RAIN TO ORDER! Final Test with Explosives--Each One Brought Copious Showers. Special to Washington Post. MIDLAND, Tex., Aug. 27.--Yesterday was the grand finale of the operations at this point of Uncle Jerry Rusk's sky-stormers, and a fitting victory was achieved by the scientists in their efforts to shake water from the burning winds of the Llano and Laredo, one of the driest regions of America. For three weeks an intermittent series of experiments has been carried out, and not in a single instance has rain failed to fall within ten or twelve hours after the explosions. Your correspondent has been on the ground, and, therefore, is cognizant of all the facts. The series was brought to a climax yesterday, when balloons containing several thousand feet of oxyhydrogen gas were sent up and exploded at heights varying from 1,000 to 10,000 feet, and at sundown batteries on the ground began their work, and until 10:30 p. m. a constant cannonade was carried on under a sky of perfect clearness, lit by countless stars of a brilliancy seldom seen in the North. The barometer promised fair and the hygrometer stood between dry and very dry. The cowboys and ranchmen said it would be utterly useless to hope for rain for a week under such conditions as existed, and all things seemed combined to withstand the terrific onslaught of the storm of the sky. At 11 p. m. Gen. Dyrness withdrew his forces and all retired for the night. Sleep, however, was soon interrupted, for at 8 a. m. the first return fire flashed from the heavens, with a peal of thunder, and the rain was soon beating on the roof. At sunrise a magnificent double rainbow arched the heavens, and the downfall of rain did not cease till 8 o'clock, a. m. A number of heavy charges of dynamite were then made, and after every one the drops again poured down, till at least the clouds were entirely expended, and there was nothing left from which to shake the water. Cattle men are jubilant over the success of the experiments and scores of invitations are daily pouring in from various localities asking further operation in their vicinity. The next series of experiments will be made at El Paso. Thence the party goes to Western Kansas.
