**HON. GEO. B. LORING**, ex minister to Portugal and former commissioner of agriculture, died suddenly at Salem, Mass., Sep. 14.

**SENATOR MITCHELL**, of Oregon, is in Washington City. He reports the people of the Pacific slope as in no way abating their ardor in favor of free silver coinage.

**WE** regret to learn that Capt. Ashe of the News and Observer, is confined to his room by sickness. His many friends and admirers wish for him a speedy recovery.

**THE** London Chronicle says that the Prince of Wales has all but decided to go to Chicago to attend the Exposition, and that he is likely to be accompanied by Emperor William of Germany.

**OFFICIAL** telegrams report that 1,500 persons perished in the destruction of Consegua by the overflow of the Amaraguillo. Hundreds of others were injured by falling buildings, and enormous numbers of cattle perished. At other places many persons were drowned and much property was damaged.

**HON. R. Q. MILLS**, of Texas, is now in Ohio to take part in the political campaign. His friends say that he is one of the best stump orators in the country, and predict that the effect of his canvass will augment the Campbell vote very materially. It is expected that Vance, Voorhees and Co. will enter the campaign late.

**THE** President is noted for his devotion to his church. His organ, the Indianapolis Journal, referring to his speech at Rutland, Vermont, says that the dullest hearer could detect a belief in fore ordination and predestination as well as in the McKinley bill and sound currency. The New York Times thinks it would have been more euphonious to say that "Harrison is a McKinley Presbyterian."

Parties returning from the Goldboro Fair last night report good attendance yesterday, a nice exhibit of horses, interesting racing, and the best display of preserves, pickles, etc. they had ever seen.

The mass meeting seeking to get the Colored Industrial College located in New Berne will be held in the court house tonight at 8 o'clock. Hons. J. E. O'Hara, Geo. H. White, and others are expected to make addresses. The committee invites every one interested, both white and colored, to attend and participate.

The Virginian says that by a special act of Congress, Hampton Road has been designated as the naval rendezvous of the world upon the occasion of the Columbian Exposition, which means that all the naval ships of the world will congregate at Norfolk preparatory to a grand naval review and parade. This will be one of the most important historical events of the world, and preparations are being made commensurate with its dignity.

The case of the Atlantic Express Company, (of which Messrs. Watson, Daniels and Bell are the incorporators) vs. the W. & W. and R. & D. Railroads will be heard before the railroad commission at Raleigh today. This express company, chartered by the late legislature, and composed of New Berne and Morehead gentlemen, is ready to commence business as soon as the proper connections can be made on railroads, but when application was made to the above mentioned roads they refused the privileges on the ground that they had already granted the Southern Express company exclusive rights, but the Atlantic Express company claims that the roads being common carriers are bound to award equal rights to all.
