The Riverdale Alliance picnic was a very pleasant affair. About 500 people attended and good addresses were made by Messrs. Jas. A. Bryan, F. D. Koonce and John C. Thomas.

The Nouse and Treat River Steamboat company's wharf property in this city which was sold at auction yesterday was purchased by Mr. Jas. Redmond for \$9,600 which is more than it cost the company with the improvements which they put on it and they purchased at private sale which speaks well for the confidence shown in New Bern property. The other property also brought satisfactory prices.

We learn from the Kingston Free Press that Dr. H. O. Hyatt, who has established a sanitarium there will about the first of next month commence the publication of a monthly sanitary journal to be called "The Herald of Health." Its size will be four five column pages which will be full of good reading matter, of interest and value to every family everywhere. The subscription price will be fifty cents a year. The first edition will be 5,000 copies, which will be circulated mostly in eastern Carolina.

Only a few days remain before the opening of the great Southern Interstate Exposition at Raleigh. Whatever is to be exhibited must be sent in speedily. Much more ought to be sent up from Craven county than has come in thus far. Send along good specimens of all farm products that have matured—corn, peas, potatoes, rice, etc., get them up for the Exposition just as you would for the New Bern Fair and while you are getting them up be sure to remember the Fair also and put aside good specimens for that. Samples of crops must be saved as they are gathered or the best will not be obtained.

The record in the office of the city clerk show that only 60 people died in New Bern during the months of May, June, July and August and of these 51 were colored and mostly old people and infants. Only 3 of the 51 died from malaria of the 9 white people who died during that period 4 were persons whose ages ranged from 50 to 84 years and the other 5 were infants. Not one of them died from malaria. We doubt whether another city in the State can show a better record than that for a third of a year and that the stickiest time of the year.

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## CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

At a special meeting of City Council, Sept. 19, 1891, the following ordinance was adopted:

It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or place any grapes or grape skins, orange or banana peels upon any of the sidewalks of this city.

Any one violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of ten dollars or ten days imprisonment.

An ordinance adopted, Aug. 13, 1891, was amended so as to read:

It shall be unlawful for any restaurant or eating saloon, being conducted in a building where intoxicating liquors are sold, to be opened for the admission of any person between the hours of twelve Saturday night and four Monday morning; and if any way of ingress and egress connecting with or leading to such place shall be found open, and persons seen passing in or out between said hours, it shall be deemed a nuisance, and upon conviction the proprietor or the one in control of such place shall be subject to a fine of fifty dollars. Provided this shall not prohibit restaurant or eating saloons from furnishing meals to their regular monthly boarders, provided the proprietor or one in charge furnish the Police Committee a list of the same.

**CHAP. 4, Sec. 5.**—Defining the fire district, was amended so as to include the block bounded by Craven, Pollock, East Front and South Front streets.

Moved that the Pump Inspector be required to give his entire time to city work, if refusing, that the Streets and Pump Committee be authorized to procure the services of another.

[Special to State Chronicle.] CONCORD, N. C., Sept. 17. The Fair is a decided success. There were 5,000 people on the grounds to-day. Governor Holt's speech was an able one and was heartily received. The Fair will pay the Association's indebtedness. The trotting race this afternoon was won by McAlister, owned by C. P. Vansory, of Greensboro; the running race by King's Creek, owned by Arthur H. Mitchell. Concord won the bicycle race. Flora hall and the poultry department are fine. The agricultural department is not very full but the specimens are fine. Col. Harry Skinner will speak tomorrow. There is fine music by the Third regiment band of Newton.

**The Exposition Band.** A musical treat is in store for those who visit the great exposition to be held in Raleigh, N. C., during October and November. The band that is to furnish music for the exposition has been selected from the most talented musicians. Some of them come from as far as the White Mountains of New Hampshire, and two from Europe. The selection of musicians was made by the musical director, who had directions to select the best, so as to furnish the most complete band that has yet performed at a southern exposition.

Good Meeting Held at the Court House.

The meeting was called to order by Geo. H. White, Esq., and on motion Gen. Robert Ransom was elected chairman, and C. E. Palmer, secretary. Gen. Ransom made a few brief and appropriate remarks, endorsing the movement of locating the College in this section of the State. Then followed appropriate speeches by Hon. J. E. O'Hara, Gen. C. A. Battle, Hon. Geo. H. White, ex-President Washington Bryan, and Mr. E. R. Dudley. We would do the speakers an injustice to even attempt to give an outline of their splendid addresses. These men bear a relation to Eastern Carolina like the great massive pillars, and iron cables do to Brooklyn bridge, but it is well said by some one, that these pillars and cables do not make the bridge. There are hundreds of bolts, bars, screws and nails, without which there would be no Brooklyn bridge to challenge the admiration of the mechanical world. So there will be no locating the proposed Agricultural and Mechanical College here, if the business men fail to do their duty. All must take hold and cherish no illusions; face the situation in lands and money which have been made in a very short time, and the Committee is still pushing the matter.
