**GOV. HILL** was the guest of the Powhatan Club of Richmond last Monday, the 19th, instant. His Excellency was on his way to Atlanta to deliver the address at the unveiling of the Grady monument, and stopped at Richmond by special request.

**THE** cordial welcome extended to Col. McClure, editor of the Philadelphia Times at the Southern Exposition was richly deserved. No man in the North has done more to restore the South to her rightful position in the Union than this distinguished Pennsylvanian.

**WE** surrender our editorial columns to the very able address of the Ecumenical Council to the twenty-five million Methodist represented in that body. Very many of our readers are Methodists and this courtesy is due them, but the address commends itself to Christians of every creed.

**A DISPATCH** to the London Times from Valparaiso of the 19th instant says evidence from a neutral source confirms the statement made that the United States squadron in Chilean waters, both in words and deeds, displayed enmity towards the Congressional navy during the recent civil war in Chili. It is, however, denied by the Navy Department at Washington.

**ASHEVILLE** was somewhat startled on Friday, the 20th, instant, by the appearance on the streets of a young lady riding on a horse without the aid of a side saddle. In other words, there was a divided skirt on exhibition. The saddle was a man's, and the young lady rode like a man. The spectacle was an entirely modest one, and the sense of security the fair rider must have enjoyed from her manner of riding should have compensated for the unusual attention she attracted.

**ACCORDING** to advices from London and other places in the North of Ireland, the Protestant population of the North is very much aroused on the subject of Irish Home Rule, in view of the liberal confidence of success in the general election. The Orange lodges are thronged with candidates for admission, and the amount of drilling that is going on is greater than in many years before. It is said that the Protestant opponents of Home Rule are organized in associations numbering at least \$80,000 men capable of bearing arms. They make no concealment of their intention to offer violent resistance to the rule of an Irish Parliament dominated, as they claim that it would be, by the Roman Catholic hierarchy.

## LOCAL NEWS.

**COTTON.**—New Berne Market.—Sales yesterday 166 bales at 6 1/2 to 7 1/4.

**We** are pleased to learn from Prof. W. R. Skinner, Principal of Vance College, who came down last night on a business trip to the city that his school at Seven Springs is in a very flourishing and satisfactory condition and as is also well pleased with the new building in which his school is located.

**A number** of the delegates to the North Carolina Disciple Missionary convention arrived during the day yesterday by the steamer Neuse and by private conveyance. Still more by the train last night, about fifty in all have arrived so far. They hold their first meeting at church this morning at 11 o'clock. See programme in another column.

**Mr. F. S. Mallory** who is in the city in the interest of a national organization known as the Iron Belt Building and Loan Association, of which Ex-Gov. Fitz Hugh Lee, of Virginia is President and which has its headquarters in Roanoke, Va., has interested some of our best business men in the company and will probably complete the organization of a branch association in this city by the election of officers today.

**Mr. W. F. Crockett** received a car load—3,500 drain tiles Wednesday from L. H. Grant's brick and tile works at Goldsboro. They will be used at places on his farm where no ditches have been dug and will also take the place of some ditches already constructed. If their use proves sufficiently satisfactory, Mr. Crockett will extend them until all portions of his farm that are in any degree too wet are drained by them.

**It is stated** that Chairman Wilson of the Railway commission says it will devote considerable time this week to the taking of depositions in the Atlantic Express company's suit against the Richmond and Danville and Wilmington and Weldon Railways in their contest for equal rights and privileges with other companies over those roads. The testimony of several witnesses was taken Monday and the case will probably be continued several days.

**Sheep-Raising Retarded by Dogs.**

**The dog and sheep** question deserves attention. It is an ordinary occurrence, to hear farmers who attempt sheep raising speak of losses they have sustained by raids of dogs. The common sense, useful and practical ought not to be displaced for the sake of sport.

**R. B. Damville** speaks thus on the subject in the Suffolk Herald:

**My dog** may kill a hundred dollars' worth of sheep for a neighbor; kill the dog it all he can do. But let the dog kill or injure his horse, and he can recover, provided I am worth enough to make it. The result is, as sheep owners have no protection from dogs, they have abandoned the industry.

**Have you** ever estimated the loss to our people? I do not know how many farms of one hundred acres there are in the county, but I do know that on each one from fifteen to thirty sheep could be kept, which would pay a profit in lamb and wool of \$8 apiece, and if improved breeds, carefully cared for and lambs marketed early, at least \$5 per head could be made. This being so, or you can discount it one-half, and see if it will not bring more money into the county from abroad than all the cattle and hogs would together. Sheep do well and are as healthy as in any part of the State, and are not like hogs, dying up with cholera three out of every five years.

## The McDougal Case.

**The McDougal case** has been removed to Cumberland county, and will be tried November 18th. The Wilmington Messenger in speaking of the case says: This will be the most noted trial in the history of the State for the past thirty years. There are about 150 witnesses, all the evidence being circumstantial, and it will take ten days to try it. The defendant stood as high in point of character as any man in the State, and the case will be watched with great interest. Both sides are represented by superb lawyers. N. A. McLean has been employed by the citizens of Robeson county, and Walter H. Neal, who is fearless and aggressive as a lawyer, by the New York Mutual Life Insurance company, in which the life of the murdered man was insured. Both sides have the ablest lawyers and advocates in this section of North Carolina and the contest will be a memorable one.

**Mr. Neal**, the attorney alluded to above, as the majority of our city readers are aware, is a former New Bernian, the son of our esteemed townsmen, Prof. Geo. W. Neal.

## SENATOR CALL.

**He is Recognized in the Official Legislative Proceedings as Having Been Elected Senator from Florida.**

**TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 16.**—On Friday last John L. Crawford, secretary of state, attached his signature and the great seal of the State of Florida to a copy of the proceedings of the joint session of the Legislature from April 21 to May 28, inclusive, certifying to the correctness of the same. This shows, of course, the proceedings of May 28, upon which date Wilkinson Call was declared duly elected United States Senator. This is the only instrument bearing the signature of Crawford and seal of the State he declined absolutely to affix them to the Governor's certificate of Davidson's appointment some days ago. Governor Fleming instructed Attorney General Lamar to institute in the Supreme court proceedings for the issuance of a mandamus compelling Crawford to sign and seal this appointment of Davidson. This morning Mr. Lamar filed with the Governor his official reply to the Governor's instructions, in which he declines to institute such proceedings, giving his reasons therefor in detail. The Attorney General holds that there is nothing in the Constitution or statutes of the State or of the United States warranted such proceedings. He has from the first been of the opinion that Mr. Call was legally elected and would be seated. Mr. Call already has in his possession this certified copy of the joint session of the Legislature, and Senator Pasco will present it to the Senate on the opening day of the session.
