The Charlotte Chronicle comes to time under the new management. Great things are expected of the Chronicle. We have had only a glance, but we see the family marks that show it to be closely related to the Statesville landmark.

The breach between Harrison and Blaine has gradually widened until it has become a yawning chasm. A Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Times says: That this strange situation of affairs can last much longer is improbable. The open hostility shown by Mr. Blaine they seem to fear indicates that he is preparing to retire in a great blaze of fire works intended to rally the entire Blaine sentiment of the country against Mr. Harrison's re-inauguration.

The Chicago Times closes an article on Chili with these patriotic words: Now we can return to first Democratic principles—hands off the politics of foreign countries, whether European, Asiatic or South American. Give us free ships, and in a short time we shall win the friendship and control the markets of the lower half of the continent, which by law of nature ought to be ours. Commerce, the civilization of the world, will make us morally supreme in the American continent as it has made Great Britain paramount in all the seas and over a seventh of the globe.

**A NEW ORLEANS** dispatch of Feb 3, says: A rice mill trust has been formed. The deal between the syndicate and the owners was consummated this morning and the trust will be in operation in forty eight hours. In fact, the syndicate, it is stated, has already assumed control. Every one of the thirteen rice mills have joined the trust. At present only a few of the more modern mills will be operated.

**DELEGATES SMITH**, of Arizona, and Harvey, of Oklahoma, have addressed the House Committee on Territories in behalf of the admission of these Territories into the Union. The effort to secure favorable action in the case of Oklahoma will be vigorous and persistent. Next Thursday a delegation of Oklahoma citizens will be in Washington and will supplement Delegate Harvey's address by some remarks to the committee.

An effort to prevent the amendment of the interstate commerce act in the direction of giving judicial weight to the finding of the Interstate Commerce Commission has been made before the Senate committee having jurisdiction of that matter. A number of representatives of railroads were present, including ex-Senator Sewell and Mr. Gray for the Pennsylvania Railroad system, and Mr. McNaught, of the Northern Pacific Railroad Company. S. H. Gray, of Camden, N. J., representing directly the West Jersey Railroad system, co-operating with the Pennsylvania Railroad system, argued against the proposed bill on the ground that it proposed to extend the powers of the commission far beyond the purpose of the original act.

**Editor Stanton.** Mr. S. W. Stanton, one of the proprietors of Seaboard, a weekly journal of New York, devoted to marine matters, which was established twenty years ago, came in on the steamer Newberne of the O. D. line yesterday, on a pleasure trip and left on his return.

Mr. Stanton, as he travels, to a certain extent combines business with pleasure and gathers points of interest for his paper. While in our city he drove out to the Fair grounds, National cemetery and other places worthy of being visited, and being a splendid draftsman took sketches of the steamers that were then in dock and that he passed as he came. ## COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

**Liquor Licenses—Special Action on Certain Taxes—Bills Allowed.**

The Board met at 11 o'clock a. m. Present Jas. A. Bryan chairman, Wm. Cleve, Dan'l Lane J. A. Meadows and E. W. Smallwood.

The minutes of last meeting were read and on motion approved. Ordered, That upon payment of the proper tax to the sheriff license be granted to G. W. Guthrie, to retail liquors for six months, commencing Jan 1st at his place of business at Club Foot creek, in Craven county. Commissioner Lane voting No.

Ordered, That the income tax charged to T. W. Dewey, tax 1891, be remitted the same being an error.

Ordered, That the valuation of property listed to H. A. Marshall, in township No. 8 be reduced from \$2,000 to \$1,500 on account of error.

Ordered, That P. M. Draney having been an active member of a fire company for seven years is not liable to pay a poll tax and the same be remitted.

Ordered, That W. G. Brinson's application for a reduction of valuation on his land on Caswell branch from \$400 to \$200 be referred to assessors of No. 8 township outside city, with instructions to report their action to next meeting of this Board.

Ordered, That upon payment of the proper tax to the sheriff license be granted to B. H. Scott to retail liquors for 6 months, ending July 1st 1892, in rear of grocery store at Five Points, New Berne, N. C.

Ordered, In the matter of W. H. Griffin and others, an order having been issued by this Board at a meeting to the county surveyor, under act of 18— to drain a certain swamp mentioned in the petition, the Commissioners having filed their report, the same is continued to next meeting for final hearing.

Ordered, That real property of N. T. Dale in township No. 8, outside city, be reduced from \$2,250 to \$1,500, an account of error in quantity of land.

Ordered, That the poll tax charged to Cicero Wood, col. No. 8 township be remitted, he being over age.

Ordered, That the poll tax charged against E. B. Hackburn, W. R. Waters, and Horace Baxter of No. 8 township for 1891, be remitted on account of their being firemen.

Ordered, That W. R. Willett, of township No. 8 be relieved from payment of one poll tax, he being charged with two by error.

Ordered, That the valuation of lot listed to Mary Culloway in township No. 8 be reduced from \$400 to \$100 on account of error and correction advised by assessors of township No. 8.

Ordered, That the valuation of lot on Stanly street, city of New Berne, listed to Gazy Green at \$125 be remitted, she having no such lot, and remittance being advised by Board assessors, township No. 8.

Ordered, That the value of lot in Pavie town listed to Lorenz Stratton at \$400 be reduced to \$250, on account of error and correction advised by board of assessors of township No. 8.

Ordered, That the value of a lot in Pavie town listed to Hannah Pearson at \$500, be reduced to \$250, on account of error and correction advised by board assessors of township No. 8.

The Board took a recess to Feb'y 2 1892, at 10 o'clock a. m.

The board met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Commissioners J. A. Bryan chairman, Wm. Cleve and E. W. Smallwood.

Ordered, That Henry Joyner, No. 8 township, be relieved from payment of poll tax on account of being a non resident of Craven county.
