CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Fire District Matters—Second Hand Clothing—Sprinkling the Streets—Sunday Liquor Laws—Fire Alarm System—Reports.

April 5, 1892.

Board met in regular session, Mayor Manly presiding, present Councilmen Ellis, Manly, Lovick, Crawford, Bell, Richardson, Miller and Oden.

Minutes last meeting read and approved.

Petition of J. W. Stewart to erect a building on Pollock street between Hancock and Middle, action referred.

Motion by Councilman Ellis to appoint a committee to revise the present boundaries of the fire district—committee Councilmen Miller, Bell and Ellis.

Petition for a light on Change street, on motion of Councilman Manly was left with S. & P. committee with power to act.

Reports of committees received. Councilman Miller reported both cemeteries in good condition, and the sexton of Cedar Grove returned to duty much improved.

Councilman Richardson introduced the following ordinance which was adopted:

Be it ordained that all second-hand clothing offered for sale within the city of New Berne shall be fumigated by the Port Physician, and a certificate furnished showing that said clothing has been fumigated, and each article shall be tagged by the Port Physician stating that said clothing is second hand, and all costs of said fumigation shall be paid by the owners of said clothing.

Any one offering such clothing for sale without first obtaining a certificate, as above set forth, shall be subject to a fine of fifty dollars for each and every offense.

Sanitary—It being warm, dry and dusty, Councilman Lovick suggested sprinkling; on motion of Councilman Ellis the S. & P. committee will place sprinkler on the streets at once.

Councilman Ellis noted the fact that less attention was being given to ways leading to liquor saloons and urged the police to a rigid enforcement of the Sunday laws.

The Treasurer submitted the annexed statement showing collections to April 1. Receipts of Tax Collector for 1892 to April 1, 11,838.44 Receipts same period this year 13,876.32

Difference in favor of this year \$2,037.88 Receipts of City Marshal 1890 431.17 Receipts same period this year 862.90

Difference in favor of this year \$441.73 Total collected over last year for same length of time, \$2,479.61.

Purchasing chairs for New Berne Fire Co., referred to Fire Dept committee to report next meeting.

Messrs. Winfield & Son have doubled the size of the blacksmith shop which is a part of their carriage factory and put in another forge.

The fine weather and light showers we are having now is making the truck crops grow with amazing rapidity. The pea fields are white with blossoms and bid fair for an abundant yield.

Two Lombardy poplars have been set on the Presbyterian church gate, one on each side and two others have been similarly placed at the gate in front of the Locust room. A dozen Cape Jessamine have also been set at desirable points for them in the church yard and also on water oaks, as fine a shade tree as can be wanted. It is planned to preserve such care bestowed upon property of this kind.
