The members of the Pembroke club have all joined the Yacht club, and hereafter there will be but one club. All the old officers tendered their resignations, which were placed upon the table, to be acted upon at adjourned meeting, Monday night, at 8:30 o'clock, at the club house.

The Elizabeth City Economist-Falcon says: "A shipment of a cargo of bullfrogs northward yesterday was a novelty in commerce and recalled the days of our boyhood when we made our first sump in the bullfrog industry. There is big money in bullfrog's hind legs."

Littleton Female College will celebrate its Tenth Anniversary at the approaching commencement. The annual sermon will be preached by Rev. J. J. Rynn, and the literary address will be delivered by Rev. J. A. Cunningham, D. D. The year just closing has been by far the most successful in the history of the Institution.

In her eight trips made during the last sixteen days, one steamer alone, the Neuse of the E. C. D. line, has taken out nearly 20,000 boxes of just two kinds of truck—cabbages and peas. The exact figures are: cabbages, 9,806; peas, 9,486; total, 19,292, besides truck of other kinds. Cabbages have been shipped from here ever since February, and the shipments will keep up a little longer. What a contrast to a few years ago when we purchased all the cabbages we used from the North and when most of our people would have said they could not have been raised successfully here.

Premiums for Big Yields. The next New Bern Fair is a good way off but it is well to bear it in mind at all times. Let our farmers remember that premiums are offered not only for good exhibits but for large yields of various crops and it is well to select some of the choicest spots on the farms and plant and cultivate with the aim of competing for those premiums.

From the premium list of the last Exhibition we take the following premiums for the largest yield of the following crops on one acre: cotton, \$85; corn, \$100; oats, \$5.00; rye, \$5.00; rice, \$5.00; sweet potatoes, \$5.00; ground peas, \$3.00; field peas and beans, \$3.00. There is also a premium of \$5.00 for the largest yield of Irish potatoes upon a half acre—not less than 100 bushels, one bushel to be exhibited. Now that the potato digging season is about to begin remember this and note your yields and save the bushel for exhibition.

STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

Elias Carr Nominated for Governor. Other Officers.

Yesterday morning we gave the results of the first three ballots for Governor. We take up the proceedings of the convention after first ballot:

After the first ballot the name of Mr. Alexander was withdrawn in favor of Mr. J. S. Carr.

The second ballot resulted: Holt, 457 8-10; Sanderlin 306 8-10; J. S. Carr 157 8-10; Elias Carr 188 8-10.

Third ballot: Holt 885 1-2; J. S. Carr 157 8-10; Sanderlin 889 4-10; Elias Carr 127; Jarvis 8 3-10.

Fourth ballot: Holt 871; J. S. Carr 157; Sanderlin, 390. Elias Carr 170; Jarvis 9.

Fifth ballot: Holt 295; J. S. Carr 227; Sanderlin 184; Elias Carr 844.

ELIAS CARR NOMINATED.

Sixth ballot: Holt 107 8-10; Sanderlin 27; J. S. Carr 243 9-10; Elias Carr 627 8 10.

Gov. Jarvis announced that 504 were necessary to choose and Mr. Elias Carr having received 637 votes, he declared him the nominee of the convention for the office of Governor of North Carolina. At this announcement the wildest enthusiasm reigned for a while. Mr. Carr being notified of his nomination repaired to the hall and was greeted with continuing cheers. He said:

Mr. Chairman and members of the Convention: No one knows better than yourselves that this compliment has been unasked. When I left my home in Edgecombe I left it with the determination, expressed to my many friends, that I would not become a candidate for the office. You have seen fit to place the banner of the Democratic party in my hands. I accept the trust, and I will do the best in my power. I do not pose before you today as a farmer who works between the plow handle, I am a farmer, I have the reputation of being a successful farmer. My work has been principally that of supervising a farm. There is only two things, which I claim to do, one is supervising a farm, and the other is voting the Democratic ticket.

R. A. Dougherty, of Alleghany county, was nominated for Lieut. Governor on the second ballot.

Other nominations were: Secretary of State, Octavius Coke; Auditor, R. M. Furman, of Asheville; Treasurer, Donald W. Bain, Wake county; Attorney General, Francis T. Osborne, Charlotte; Superintendent of Public Instruction, J. C. Scarborough.

Evangelistic Meetings.

The great tent was filled again last night, and Mr. Fife preached an apt and impressive sermon from Matthew, 6: 33, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you." He applied the text to the unconverted as laying on them the obligations to give the seeking of God and his righteousness priority over everything else, and forbidding to defer the matter for any consideration. He also applied the text to Christians as binding them to attach more importance to religious duties and obligations than to making money or to any other worldly pursuit, and binding them not to let business affairs or calls on their time at any other character keep them at any time from performing duties that the exigencies of the times might need from them.

The meetings are well attended and both the morning and evening meetings and the after meetings are greatly enjoyed and making their impression for good.

The crowd grows larger with every meeting that has been held. Fifteen hundred would not be an over-estimate for those present.

South Carolina Democrats.

COLUMBIA, May 18:—The State Democratic convention met here at noon, consisting of 316 delegates. Thirty-one are opposed to Tillman and the Farmers' Alliance, Senator Irby, chairman of the Democratic State Executive Committee, called the convention to order, and J. Talbert, ex State Alliance Lecturer, was made president. Tillman and anti-Tillman delegations from Richmond county claimed seats. The latter were seated.

A caucus was held of the Alliance delegates and the delegates sympathizing with the Farmers' Alliance, and over three-fourths of the delegates were present. The caucus decided to vote for Governor, B. K. Tillman; Senator, J. L. M. Irby; J. Wm. Stokes, president State Farmers' Alliance, and C. W. Jasper Talbert, ex-State Alliance lecturer, as delegates at large to the National Democratic convention, and adopted resolutions of deep hostility to Cleveland, condemning him as representative of Wall Street.

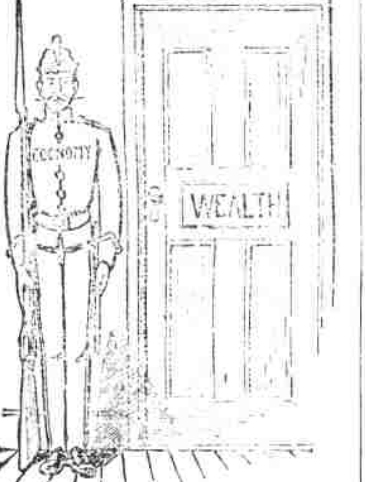
