Another Adlai Stevenson.  
A correspondent of the Wilmington Messenger says: Apropos of the North Carolina descent of General Adlai E. Stevenson I am surprised that no paper that I have seen has commented on the fact that there is an Adlai Stevenson living in Statesville, N. C., who, while unknown to popular fame, has a reputation that reached farther than that of his Illinois namesake.

This Mr. Stevenson is known to botanists, and archeologists the world over as one of the most accurate authorities on those subjects, and as possessor of one of the finest private collections of Indian relics in this country. He has been for years in correspondence with the leading scientists in these departments both in this country and in Europe; and classified collections have been made by him for temporary loan to European universities.

Mr. Stevenson is a gentleman of singularly modest bearing with long silver hair falling to his shoulders and a face of sweet gentleness and dignity. He looks as if he had come out of an Old-World picture, and the writer on coming out of his museum remarked that the collector was even more interesting than the collection.

## Fine Musical Instruments and Great Success.

Mr. Willie Stallings, representing Mr. A. Cohn, went down to the Methodist conference at Morehead yesterday with one of Newman Bros. patent air circulating reed cell organs. This distinctive feature in these organs is a comparatively recent invention which gives an improved tone as to expression and volume to the instruments containing it, causing the music produced to very closely resemble that produced by the large pipe organs, thus giving churches of limited means the opportunity of having superior music at a very moderate cost. Mr. Cohn has the right of the entire State in selling them.

Yesterday Mr. Cohn figured up his sales for the first six months of the year and found that he had sold \$6,400 worth of pianos and \$2,400 of organs. His patronage comes from over twenty counties of the State and he made two sales in Virginia and one in Missouri though he did not canvass in any way beyond the State. Such remarkable success could not come except from square dealing and having instruments of decided merit to offer his many customers. Mr. Cohn is energetic and deserves the success he is meeting with.

**Ratification Meeting.**  
A large number of the Democratic voters of Craven county met in the court house at New Berne on the night of the 4th of July for the purpose of ratifying the action of the Democratic State and National conventions. James W. Biddle was chosen chairman and C. A. Battle Secretary. On motion the chair appointed Matt Manly, C. A. Battle, S. R. Street, S. W. Smallwood, R. D. Hancock, F. M. Simmons and W. D. Melver, a committee on resolutions. The committee retired, but returned in a short while and asked for further time, whereupon the meeting adjourned to Wednesday night July 6th.

At the appointed hour the meeting reassembled. Chairman Biddle took the chair, called the meeting to order, and announced that the report of the committee on resolutions was in order.

Gen. Battle, in behalf of the committee, presented the following report which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, the Democrats of Craven county, State of North Carolina, have assembled in mass meeting for the purpose of ratifying the proceedings of the late State and National conventions of the Democratic party, and whereas the nomination by the State convention of Elias Carr for Governor, R. A. Daughton for Lieutenant Governor, Octavius Coker for Secretary of State, R. M. Furman for Auditor, D. W. Baine for Treasurer, J. C. Scarborough for Superintendent of Public Instruction, and F. L. Osborne for Attorney General, meets our hearty concurrence; and whereas the nomination by the National Democratic convention, of Grover Cleveland for President and Adlai E. Stevenson for Vice President challenges our enthusiastic approval, therefore

Resolved, that the Democratic party of Craven county endorse the National and State platforms, and ratifies the nominations of the National and State conventions, and pledges itself to work during the coming campaign for the success of the Democratic National and State tickets.

After the adoption of the report loud calls were made for Mr. Simmons. That gentleman, once the faithful and distinguished Representative of this district in Congress, took the stand and for three quarters of an hour rivaled the attention and elicited the approval of the large and enthusiastic meeting.

Judge Henry R. Bryan was then called on to speak. The Judge gracefully declined to make a political speech, but cordially endorsed the action of the State and National conventions. Then came loud and repeated calls for Stevenson. In response, Mr. M. D. W. Stevenson made a felicitous and stirring speech. General Battle followed Mr. Stevenson and the speech-making of the evening was closed by C. B. Thomas, Esq., in an effective and timely address. At 11 o'clock the convention adjourned with everybody happy and confident.

**Advantages of Manufacturing in the South.**  
The Trademan says the reason why the iron industry of New England has played out can be told in a few words and proceeds to tell it as follows:

"New England, with none of the raw materials for iron making under her soil could only carry on the trade so long as other sections that had these materials in abundance failed to compete with her. So soon as competition by Pennsylvania, the West and South showed strength the trade disappeared from the East."

Manifestly, the same conditions that governed the iron industry will prevail in cotton manufacturing. In fact the same results are being worked out and northern mill owners are finding that they are working under a great disadvantage in competing with Southern ones.

Now is the opportune time for embarking in such enterprises, that they may grow up with the expansion of the industry in the South. We urge a careful investigation of the subject upon those of our citizens who have the means that will enable them to establish a factory.

Money in such an enterprise rightly equipped and properly conducted in a place so favorably located for it as New Berne will be a good investment.


