THE people of Washington, N. C., had a big time on the Fourth. Speeches were made by ex-Governor Jarvis, Mr. Elias Carr and others. The latter made a splendid impression and was warmly received.

THE Democratic campaign has not opened yet, but a great deal of work has been done for the ticket by two distinguished gentlemen whose assistance was not expected. Their names are Harrison and Carnegie.—Ex.

THE high fence with electric-wire guards which Mr. Carnegie has put around the Homestead Mills in anticipation of trouble during the impending strike indicates that what he really wants is "protection" from American labor.

PERHAPS the most practical use to which a Republican campaign fund could be put now would be to make a contribution to Mr. Carnegie sufficient to enable him to pay his men decent wages and discontinue his preparations for a long siege. An object-lesson such as he is furnishing is rather discouraging to orators who try to explain how the McKinley tariff has benefited American labor.

THUS far in the current year the American flag has been twice displayed in Canada, and on each occasion the flag has been torn down once by the militia and once by the town constable, but we have yet to hear of the first American who has allowed his serenity to be disturbed by these exhibitions of bad temper. The Fourth of July has come round just as these events had never happened.—World.

GEN. James B. Weaver, the nominee by the Third party for the presidency, is a native of Ohio, where he was born in 1833. He won his title of Brigadier General during the war, and practiced law in Iowa until 1879, when he was elected to Congress. The next year he was nominated for President by the Greenback party, and got 307,740 votes. He has since served several terms in Congress. The nominee for the Vice-Presidency is James G. Field, of Virginia.

MISS KATE FIELD predicts the election of Cleveland, and is going to do her breezy best to make her prediction come true. It was the opinion of ex-Speaker Reed that the Democrats owed their overwhelming success in 1890 to the efforts of American women. Nothing has occurred since that time to change the feminine mind. The McKinley tariff still bars the way to cheapness, from A to Z, in the long list of fabrics, furs and finery with which the loveliest creature in the world seeks to make herself lovelier.

**GRAVEN COUNTY IN LINE.**

The ratification meeting held in New Bern on last Wednesday night set the Democratic ball in motion in glorious old Craven. "Cleveland Carr and Victory" was in the air.

The resolutions were received with applause and adopted with great enthusiasm. Mr. Simmons was the first speaker, and never did he appear in better trim as the champion of Democracy. His portrayal of Cleveland and Stevenson was superb and his presentation of Carr and his associates on the State ticket drew out rapturous applause, while his scathing review of the Republican and Peoples' parties received the emphatic endorsement of all who heard him.

Mr. Stevenson followed Mr. Simmons. He did not claim to be half brother or first cousin to the Democratic candidate for Vice President, but he proved himself to belong to the great Democratic family, and entitled to a seat very near the head of the table. His speech was a ringing one, and it would be hard to tell which Stevenson received the greater applause.

Gen. Battle spoke for the Democratic party. Referred to the fact that for more than half a century the Democratic party administered the Government, securing honor abroad and prosperity at home; that every foot of territory added to the public domain was acquired under Democratic Administration, except the territory of Alaska—fit emblem of the freezing tendencies of the Republican party; that during this period, in which England and Mexico had been humbled and savage tribes subdued, not one drop of American blood had been shed by American hands—that the Republican party broke the Constitution and forced upon the south "inequality in the Union or independence out of it," and made the war between the States inevitable; that Cleveland's administration was national and restored the South to her position as a sovereign State of the Union.

Mr. Thomas spoke for Harmony—the union of Democratic hearts and hands: thorough organization and earnest work from now to the day of the election. At the conclusion of Mr. Thomas' excellent speech a Cleveland and Carr club was organized, of which Wm. M. Watson Esq., is President.

Craven sends greeting to her sister counties of the old north State: her watchword Cleveland and Carr; her reply, "The Idea of November and VICTORY!"

Clark, of Wake County, of the town of South Kingstown in the State of Rhode Island, Richard P. Williams, of the city of New Bern, North Carolina, Frank R. Arnold and Robert R. Fletcher, of the city and county of Craven, North Carolina, and such others as they may associate with them.

The name of said corporation shall be "The New Bern Water, Electric Light and Railway Company." The business thereof shall be for the purpose of mining for water, owning, constructing and operating a system of water works, and the sale of water; the manufacture, generating and sale of electricity, electrical apparatus and machinery for power, heat, lighting and all uses to which electricity may be applied; and the constructing and equipping a Street Railway or Railways and operating the same by electric or other power, and with power to erect stations therefor.

That the place where said business shall be carried on shall be the city of New Bern, county of Craven, North Carolina. That the time of the existence of this corporation is limited to thirty years.
