The Raleigh News & Observer says the Richmond and Danville Railroad Company has instructed its conductors to pass free all pensioners of the State of North Carolina over their lines en route to the Confederate Veteran's Remont at Wrightsville, August 16th to 20th, inclusive, upon presentation of a certificate signed by the clerks of the Superior Courts of the various counties that the holder thereof is a pensioner of the State of North Carolina and his name regularly appears on the pension roll.

A fight, participated in by eight or ten people, took place Sunday afternoon on South Front street at the foot of German. Sticks were used but not much harm resulted. Some of the parties had been drinking. Five were arrested; tried yesterday, and fined \$5 each and costs which makes a total of \$8.70. Other arrests are to be made. Most of the men were colored but two white ones were concerned in the disturbance. It took place while Rev. J. F. Butt was conducting an open air prayer meeting a very short distance away.

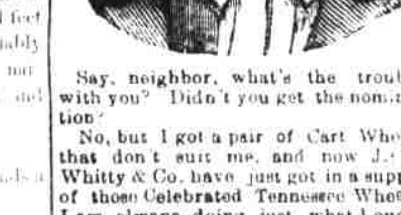

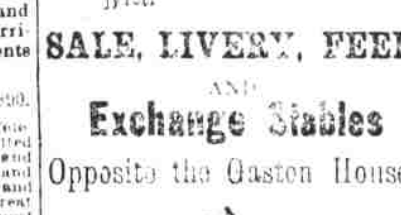
