COUNTY COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS.

SEPTEMBER 5, 1892.

The Board met at 11 o'clock. Present, Commissioners, Jas. A. Bryan, chairman, E. W. Smallwood, J. A. Meadows, Daniel Lane and Wm. Cleve.

Mr. Asa Jones tendered his resignation as cotton weigher for the city of New Berne which was on motion adopted.

On motion Commissioner Meadows, it is ordered that no assessment for the taxation be made against the property of the New Berne Sewerage Company for 1892 because in its present condition it is considered valueless.

Ordered, that the clerk of the Board notify the supervisors of public roads of township No. 6 to appear before this Board on the first Monday in October and show cause why the road leading from Hancock creek to Beaufort road should not be re-established as a public road.

Ordered, that a voucher for \$2.00 be issued to Hatch Heath for support of Lizzie Woods and her five children.

Ordered, that the voting place in Russell's precinct, township No. 3, be changed from the barn of R. A. Russell to the office of J. W. Lane at Barnwell village.

Ordered, that the voting place at Arnold's store township No. 9 be and is hereby discontinued. Notice is hereby given that the polls of said precinct will be held at Jasper in said township.

Ordered, that the clerk give notice by publication in the New Berne DAILY JOURNAL of the change of the polling place from Russell's barn to J. W. Lane's office at Barnwell village, township No. 3, and the discontinuance of the voting place at Arnold's store, township No. 7, as required by law.

Ordered, that the following persons be and hereby are appointed registrars of the voters for the various election precincts of Craven county, and that the clerk of this Board make immediate publication of such appointments at the court house door, and further that the sheriff serve a notice of said appointment upon each registrar:

MONDAY AFTERNOON. September 5. The Board met pursuant to adjournment, Jas. A. Bryan, chairman, E. W. Smallwood, Daniel Lane, Wm. Cleve and J. A. Meadows.

The Board commenced the revision of the jury list as the law requires.

Took a recess till next day, 10 o'clock. Tuesday, Sept. 6.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Jas. A. Bryan, chairman; E. W. Smallwood, Daniel Lane and Wm. Cleve.

The chairman presented to the Board for cancellation the following Craven county bonds purchased by him for credit of the sinking fund to-wit: Bonds of the denomination of \$300.00 numbered 77 and 92. Bonds of the denomination of \$25.00 numbered 44, 45, 54, 1096, 1097, 1098, 1099, 1099, 1091, 1092, 1093, 1094, 1095—amounting in the aggregate to \$1,350.00.

On motion the chairman appointed Commissioners Lane and Cleve a committee to destroy said bonds which they did by burning the same in the presence of the Board, Register of Deeds and ex-commissioner S. W. Latham.

On motion E. K. Bryan is appointed cotton weigher for the city of New Berne to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Asa Jones, and the clerk is directed to notify him to appear before the Board and give the bond required by law.

Ordered, that the sheriff be hereby instructed to refund to Wm. S. Gaskins the poll collected from him for 1891, he being over 50 years of age.

Ordered, that Jas. A. Bryan, chairman of this Board, be appointed proxy for Craven county to vote the stock of said county in the A. & N. C. Railroad at the next meeting of stockholders of said road.

The Board on motion took a recess till 3 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION. The Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Commissioners Jas. A. Bryan, E. W. Smallwood and Wm. Cleve. They proceeded with the work of revising the jury list.

On motion a recess was taken till 10 o'clock next morning.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, Sept. 7, 1892. The Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Present, Commissioners, J. A. Bryan, Wm. Cleve and E. Smallwood.

The revision of the jury list was completed.

Ordered, that the clerk of the Board notify the sheriff that he will be required to settle with the commissioners for taxes collected for 1891 on the 20th day of September, 1892.

Whereas, L. H. Cutler, president of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of New Berne, has under oath filed with the clerk of No. 9 township, Craven county, an abstract setting forth that the capital stock of said Farmers and Merchants Bank is worth but 75 cents in the dollar and whereas the said L. H. Cutler has made complaint before this Board that the valuation of said capital stock appears upon the tax list at 100 cents in the dollar, and whereas the valuation of said stock was by reason of a misunderstanding, upon the part of the list taker above referred to entered at 100 cents instead of 75 cents as listed by said Cutler. It is

Ordered, that the valuation of said capital stock be reduced from 100 to 75 cents on the dollar and so entered upon the tax list.

It is ordered that a copy of this order be served upon the sheriff.
