The turpentine still belonging to Major A. R. Dennison, located on Trent river at the railroad crossing, took fire last night at 11:30 o'clock, but was put out by buckets of water before any serious damage occurred. Both fire engines responded but their services were not needed.

A social gathering of our citizens, both ladies and gentlemen, will be held at the Y. M. C. A. Hall, Friday evening. The prime object of the meeting is the formal introduction of the secretary, Mr. T. G. Wilkinson, to our people and the welcoming of him by them to our midst. An interesting program is being arranged for the entertainment of the audience.

Considering the circumstances a fairly good number of stockholders of the A. & N. C. R. went down to Morehead last night to attend the annual meeting today.

Two things initiated against a large attendance—the rainy weather and the Stevenson speaking today at Goldsboro. The probabilities are that there will be few if any changes made.

A determined mob are after a young white man named James Chatman, in Chatham county, for abduction and assault of a young girl. He was captured in South Carolina, and it was only through the shrewdness of the sheriff that he has been able to evade a maddened mob of fifty men who have sworn vengeance upon the wretch. No sooner than the prisoner was placed in jail at Pittsboro than he had to be taken out and secreted in an old barn and from there to the jail at Raleigh.

We were shown yesterday by Mr. J. T. Hall, a Jones county, North Carolina lemon which his niece sent him from Trenton. It was raised by Mrs. Kinsey of that village and is a large and perfect shaped a specimen as is grown anywhere. It weighs over half a pound. Mr. Hall has it in his show case where any one may see it. The tree this year bore about two dozen. If they keep all right some of the fruit will be on exhibition at the New Berne Fair.

Wittis H. Brogden, of Wayne county, who killed his neighbor, Fabius E. Sauer, has just been tried at Goldsboro for the crime. The jury, after remaining out all Tuesday night, brought in a verdict of manslaughter with recommendation to mercy. There was also a large petition to the same effect signed by all classes of the citizens both ladies and gentlemen. Taking these matters into consideration, Judge H. R. Bryan, who was presiding, made the sentence simply six years in the penitentiary. The convict is a brother of ex-Gov. Brogden.
