THE Railway Commission is preparing the annual statements of all the railroads in the State. The Wilmington and Weldon leads them all. Its report shows gross earnings from operation \$1,453,012; operating expenses \$802,384; net income from other sources, \$184,943. There was paid a dividend of 8 per cent., amounting to \$200,000, leaving a surplus of \$171,991 from the operation during the year ending June 30, 1892.

HERE is a specimen of the big claims made in advance by the one-Third party as told by the North Carolinian: The claims of the leaders of the party-of-a-few-of-the people are so extravagant that well informed men can put no reliance in their predictions. Its Work Yesterday—List of Delegates. The 9th annual session of the Atlantic Baptist Association is now in progress. The Association assembled yesterday morning in the Baptist Church. Rev. J. T. Albritton of Mt. Olive was elected moderator, and Mr. J. B. Williams Sr., of Snow Hill was elected clerk of the Association. There are about 26 Churches in the Association and most of them are represented in the meeting.

The morning session was pretty well taken up in reading letters or reports from the different churches; some of them were read in the afternoon. They gave a good showing of the work done and indicated a healthy progress generally. Rev. E. J. Edwards, Agent of the Thomasville Orphan Home; presented his claims in the afternoon. He gave some interesting facts in the history of the Home, what it is, what it is accomplishing, its present condition, outlook for the future, need of generous support for it, etc. Several others followed Mr. Edwards in advocacy of this work and a good collection and subscription for the benefit of the 124 needy little ones it is now sheltering was made at the conclusion of the remarks.

FAMLECO COUNTY CONVENTION.

Organization, Nominations and Resolutions. The Democratic County Convention of Pamlico County met at Bayboro on Saturday October 8th at 11 o'clock a. m. and was called to order by Hon. W. T. Cahoon, Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee, after making an appropriate speech which was received with applause. Mr. Cahoon, chairman, called Dr. Geo. S. Atmore to the chair as temporary chairman, and Geo. F. Farrell as temporary secretary. Dr. Atmore on taking the chair made a few appropriate remarks and then announced the convention ready for business.

On motion of W. T. Cahoon, the temporary organization was made permanent. The vote of precincts was called and all were represented but two. Their being no contesting delegations the committee on credentials was dispensed with. On motion of W. T. Cahoon the chairman appointed the following committee on resolutions, to wit: Township No. 1, Geo. Deas. Township No. 2, R. L. Woodard. Township No. 3, J. F. Sawyer. Township No. 4, W. J. Mayo. Township No. 5, J. B. Eruell. The committee reported the following resolutions:

Resolved 1, That we the Democrats of Pamlico county in convention assembled do again re-affirm our allegiance to the Democratic party, and endorse the platform of the party adopted at its late State and National Conventions.

Resolved 2, That we pledge our united and divided support to the nominees of the Democratic party, National, State and County, and promise to use all honorable means in our power to secure their election.

Resolved 3, That we sorrowfully deplore the action of those of our brethren who have heretofore been with us in our efforts to hurl from power the Republican party, who alone are responsible for the pernicious legislation that have impoverished our people, and we beseech them to return, and aid us in restoring the National Government once more to the people by the electing of a Democratic Congress and Grover Cleveland the greatest living American Statesman to the Presidency of these United States; this being the only means, by which the great reforms so much needed by our people, can be obtained and peace, happiness and prosperity assured.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted with much enthusiasm. On motion of W. T. Cahoon the convention then proceeded to the nomination of Coroner, Dr. John P. Redding and W. K. Hooker, the present incumbent were placed in nomination. At the request of Mr. Hooker, his name was withdrawn and Dr. John P. Redding was nominated by acclamation. Paul F. Tingle the present incumbent was renominated by acclamation, for County Surveyor, Thomas D. Perkins was renominated for Register of Deeds by acclamation, John T. Cooper was renominated for County Treasurer by acclamation and Thomas Campen was renominated for Sheriff by acclamation.

George Deas and R. L. Woodard were placed in nomination for Representative in the Legislature. Roll of precincts was called, and a vote taken which resulted as follows on first ballot: George Deas received eleven and one-fourth votes.

R. L. Woodard received fourteen and three-fourths votes. A majority was declared the nominee of the convention; on motion his nomination was made unanimous. Mr. Woodard came forward and accepted the nomination gracefully, and promised to do all in his power to elect himself and the others of the Democratic ticket.

The following were the Constables nominated by the various Townships: Township No. 1, E. T. Holton, Jr. Township No. 2, John T. Davenport. Township No. 3, Graham Jones. Township No. 4, Lemuel Leary. Township No. 5, G. W. Harrison.

The following were elected for the Democratic Executive Committee for two years: Festus Miller chairman, George Deas, Samuel W. Ferabee, Wiley J. Mayo, Joseph F. Harris. Gen. Battle then addressed the convention on the political issues of the day. His speech was a strong presentation of the Democratic position, upon all the issues and the fallacies of the People's Party, and it was loudly applauded, at his close Dr. F. P. Gater offered the following resolutions which were adopted:

Resolved, That the Democratic party of Pamlico county tenders to Gen. Cullen A. Battle their heartfelt thanks for the canvass that he has made in this county for the able, eloquent and patriotic speech just delivered, and in this way show their high appreciation of his valuable services in this campaign. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

On motion the secretary was instructed to send a copy of these resolutions to the New Berne JOURNAL, The True Issue, The News & Observer and the North Carolinian for publication.
