Three of the most prominent colored men in New Berne are out spoken in their admiration of Cleveland and it is more than probable that they are going to vote for him. They also oppose the force bill.
Rev. C. G. Vardell will preach his sermon this morning by a short account of the work of Synod. His sermon will also be based on that topic. It will be from the text, "Let There be Light," Gen. 1:3.
Rev. Theo. Dixon, the noted young Baptist Divine, has been arrested in New York for shooting song birds. Eighteen robins and eleven larks cost him \$155. He did not know it was in violation of the law and resisted the officer at first.
The Newton Enterprise furnishes the following gold mine news: "Mr. Mike Ruffy has struck it rich in his gold mine near Catawba. One day last week he got out one rock which yielded \$1,000. There are rumors afloat that it has been sold at a big price.
The next session of the Western North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, will be held in Winston. Bishop Hendrix has changed the date of the Western North Carolina Conference from Wednesday, November 30th, to Thursday, December 1st. This change is made necessary on account of the change in date of the South Carolina Conference from December 14th to November 24th.
The Rocky Mount Argonaut has the following to say of coming improvements in that town: "A large English syndicate are figuring to establish a \$250,000 cotton mill in Rocky Mount. A large cigarette factory has been arranged for, while two other factories are preparing to locate here. A company to build a large hotel is being organized and other new enterprises are being arranged for."
Mr. Nunn Nunn brought in our office yesterday a few oranges as green in color as leaves on the trees. Notwithstanding their appearance they were perfectly ripe and when sampled them we found less acid taste than in any orange we had ever before ate. Mr. Nunn informed us that they were the Saville sweets—a new kind here and that his firm, Nunn & McSorley, had just received 3,000 of them.
Mr. J. S. Carr, of Durham, has presented the trustees of Davidson College with ten shares of stock in the Durham Fertilizer Company. These shares are of the par value of \$100 each, so Mr. Carr's donation to Davidson College amounts to \$1,000. When it is remembered that Davidson College is a Presbyterian institution, and that Mr. Carr is a member of the Methodist Church, his generosity in this instance is the more remarkable.
The concluding work of the United States Court was the pronouncing of the following penalties on parties convicted during the term who had not previously been sentenced: Jas. Rogers, for illicit distilling, 3 months in either Craven or Carteret county jail at the discretion of the marshal; and a fine of \$100 and costs. Profitable Fishing.
The last copy of the Morehead City Enterprise gives the following in reference to catches of fine fish at that place.
Mr. William R. Willis, one of our fifteen year old boys, made \$35.00 fishing last week.
Mr. James Hancock made \$97.00 fishing last week.
Messrs. Walter Garris and Martin Willis and crews caught and sold over \$500.00 worth of Spanish mackerel and other fish last week.
Messrs. John Lewis, Walter Willis and Walter Guthrie on a recent night caught five thousand Spanish mackerel in the inlet two miles from Morehead. They sold the fish for \$650.00. This is the largest catch known there in ten years.
Such items of marvellous successes at fishing are very interesting. They are also extremely agreeable news, as they indicate that the increasing development of the fishing industry is not detracting from the profits of the work but, instead, it seems to be paying better and better with each passing year.
If you want to investigate this marvellous mine of wealth of Eastern Carolina whose riches may be had for the taking, be present at the next exhibition of the East Carolina Fish, Oyster, Game and Industrial Association which will be held in this city the entire week beginning Monday, February 20th, 1893. No better and more beautiful display of fish in manifold varieties, together with apparatus of every description used in taking them can be found than will there be shown.
The Presbyterian Orphanage.
The N. C. Presbyterian in its notes on Synod gives the following statements in reference to the Presbyterian Orphanage: The former buildings and furniture were destroyed by fire Nov. 19th, 1891. Temporary quarters were had in Statesville from then until September 27th, 1892, when the present buildings were occupied. A memorial building by Geo. W. Watts, to his daughter "Annie Louise" is completed and furnished or nearly so. Synod tendered special thanks to Mr. Watts for his munificent donation. The Synod's cottage for boys has been paid for provisionally—an actual deficit of \$524 remaining on it.
A donation of land has been made by Mr. Davout which largely increases the value of premises. The property now owned in land and buildings amounts in value to about \$18,000, and this Dr. Ruple tendered to Synod for dedication to Almighty God, the father of the fatherless. It is proposed to provide as soon as circumstances permit, an infirmary, a cooking room, a chapel, etc.
The mode of conducting the Orphanage as explained by Dr. R. W. Boyd the Superintendent to Synod shows that it is managed both judiciously and economically.
