Constitutionally a tax can have no other basis than the raising of revenues for public puposes, and whatever gov-ernmental exaction has not this basis is tyrannical and unlawful, A tax on imports, therefore, the purpose of which is not to raise revenue, but to discourage and indirectly prohibit some particular import for the benefit of some home manufacturer, may well be questioned as being merely colorable, and therefore not warranted by constitutional principles.
