A THOUGHTFUL article in the Columbia (S. C.) Record takes a very cheerful view of the agricultural situation in that State, declaring that the overproduction and low price of cotton in 1892 proved a blessing in disguise, in that it turned the attention and directed the energies of the farmers to other products of the soil. This, it is evident, has been to some extent the case in North Carolina, and, with the success of the experiments in other crops, there may be expected a decided and salutary change in the system of the tillage of the soil.

ing away, and that a more perfect Union will be one of the happy results of the election.

Democracy once more triumphant, we may anticipate a future rich in all the blessings of constitutional liberty, and if the people remain true to Democratic principles, the Republic will go forward in a career of unparalleled prosperity for ages to come.
