STATE CHAIRMAN SIMMONS. A Royal Welcome Extended to Him in Appreciation of His Campaign Services.

A large crowd assembled at the depot previous to the arrival of the train Saturday night to do honor to our distinguished citizen, Hon. F. M. Simmons, who so skillfully managed the Democratic hosts in this State in the political battle which has just closed in the most glorious victory known.

Fire works previously arranged were fired as the train rolled in and the brilliant display, lively music, and loud huzzas greeted Mr. Simmons as he stepped on the platform, and speedily he was in a carriage, headed by the band and followed by a long procession of citizens with torches, transparencies, &c.

After marching on Queen, Graves, Middle and Broad streets, the wigwam was reached, another pyrotechnic display took place, as many as could enter and after it was filled, others packed themselves around the door and at the windows in the eagerness to see and hear what was going on.

Mr. Jas. A. Bryan on behalf of the Democratic club, the Democratic County Executive Committee and the people, welcomed Mr. Simmons home with words well timed, rightly dividing the honors for the victory with the patriotic masses and with the leader to whose efforts is due so large a share of the credit.

Mr. Simmons speech was the most felicitous. He spoke of that moment as the happiest of his life. He had received plaudits from other parts of the State, but none had touched his heart as this grand ovation. He rejoiced in the victory won and while acknowledging the hard work he, as chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, had done, he highly complimented the people for the stand they had taken when their homes and firesides were threatened by the tyranny of the Republican party.

He gloried in the National victory. He had longed to see Cleveland elected because he considered him the grandest man in the universe. He was overjoyed at the election of Stevenson because of his marked skill in chopping off Republican heads.

Mr. Simmons' remarks were extremely well received, and at their close after the Hon. L. J. Moore had, upon being called for, added a few words of rejoicing at the result of the election and appreciation of his services, three rousing cheers for Mr. Simmons were given and the assemblage dispersed. The ovation was enthusiastic and it was deserved.
