TAKE TIME BY THE FORELOCK.

Never be too late. Seize the propitious moment. Take Time by the Forelock.

Applicable at all times and on all occasions, the present is most favorable for the practical illustration of this sentiment.
 The two houses of Congress are now heterogeneous, but the time is not distant when they will be in perfect accord. Soon the period will have passed when reform measures approved by the House can be delayed and defeated in the Senate.

"The prudent man foresees the evil and hideth himself, but the simple pass on and are punished."
 The American Senate has been regarded as the highest deliberative body on earth. In its collective capacity it commands universal respect, yet, in all the world there is not a legislative assembly that more needs to "take time by the forelock."

It is never the part of wisdom to stand in the way of the inevitable, while it is always wise to skillfully avoid or break the force of an impending blow.
 It is more than evident that the protective tariff is doomed, and the instincts of self-preservation, to say nothing of the suggestions of enlightened statesmanship, should prompt Senators to take time by the forelock and pass the tariff amendments that were carried through the House during the last session of Congress.

It is a fact, within the knowledge of astute observers, that the McKinley bill passed the Senate solely as a party measure. Mr. Blaine clearly saw its folly and destructiveness. He pointed out the fact that "it did not open a market for a single additional bushel of wheat or barrel of flour," and he used his influence with Senators to inject reciprocity into it as a possible saving clause.

What is reciprocity but free trade handicapped by cumbersome legislation? Republicans stab protection by the advocacy of reciprocity.
 It is evident that McKinleyism has been relegated to the limbo of discarded shams and exploded humbugs. There is ample warrant, therefore, for every Republican Senator, who supported the McKinley bill reluctantly as a party measure, to aid in passing the remedial measures without waiting for the time when the control of the Senate shall pass into Democratic hands.

Senator Allison has said in an interview, that, "if the Democratic majority in the House of Representatives would content itself with proposing certain amendatory measures to the present law, such

as the reduction of duties on woolen manufactures, and placing other articles, wool for instance, on the free list, it might be that no obstruction would be placed in the way of their passage by the Republicans of the Senate."
 This is just what the Democratic House did. Has the distinguished Senator been asleep? Or is it incompatible with Senatorial dignity to observe the action of the House?
 In a little while the Democrats will control both houses of Congress, and then measures of relief can be passed without let or hindrance; but if Republican Senators will take time by the forelock, they can hasten the result and have part in the glory of the achievement.

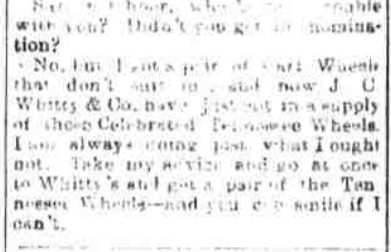
