A correspondent of the Wilmington facts in reference to it:

About the year 1866 a novel and incresting fact became well established, to wit: That certain comets are followed ty streams of meteors which move along the orbit of the comet of that system And so it came to pass that, as it seemed certain that Biela's comet had ceased to exist as such, it might appear as a stream of meteors and produce a shower on or about November 27th, 1872, the day when the earth reaches the point in her orbit intersected by that of the comet, The Naval Reserve will meet tomorrow And if so, the meteors would all tacheron hall space apparently situated in the constellation Andromeda, the position of the point of the orbit of Biela' comet nearest the earth. It was therefore predieted that on the night of November Mr. John Bowden's house now stands 27th, 1872, a meteoric shower would take completed. He expects to move in it place and that the meteors would all rediate from Andromeda which prediction was fully verified in every respect. Again on the 27th November, 1885, another shower, more splendid than the other occurred, 32,000 meteors having been counted between the hours of 6 p.m. stell gion. And I may add that the extraordinary display of meteors here on Wednesday night last was from the same meteor stream and radiated from Andro-meda; no less than 3,500 to 4,000 baving been seen between 6 o'clock p. m. and 11 o'clock p. m. Whether it be followed by a grander display on Sunday night next temains to be seen, but it is probable.


