Next Friday is the time for Geo. Best, col. to be hung for murdering his wife by poison. An effort is being made to have the Governor commute his sentence to imprisonment for life. Hon. W. T. Cabo went up to Raleigh yesterday to work in his behalf. If the Governor concludes to stand "hands off," Best's time on earth is short.

The Baptist State Convention met Wednesday night in Raleigh, 268 delegates being present. Dr. R. H. Mash, of Oxford, called the convention to order as president, and Rev. Dr. J. S. Hardaway preached the opening sermon. The attendance of prominent preachers both from this State and other States is large, and the principal Baptist papers of the South have representatives there.

Wayne county's tax collector went to Raleigh Monday and has made a full settlement of taxes due the State from that county, amounting to \$14,710.46. 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COUNTY COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS.

The New Board at Work—Liquor Licenses Granted—Bonds of Officers—Elected.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment at 11 o'clock a.m., Tuesday Dec. 6. Present, Commissioner Jas. A. Bryan, Ch'nn, E. W. Smallwood, M. H. Carr, W. C. Brewer and J. A. Meadows.

Ordered, That the poll tax charged to H. P. Dougherty, Township No. 3, for 1892, be remitted, he being over 50 years of age.

Ordered, That Thos. Bryan be hired to Jos. Kinsey for 6 months at the rate of \$6.00 per month, upon his giving satisfactory security for said hiring pursuant to order of the court.

Whereas, Amos, W. Conner, elected on the 8th day of November, 1892, Coroner of Craven county, having failed to present his official bond for said office on the first Monday in December, 1892, as required by law, it is

Ordered, That the said office of Coroner of Craven county be and hereby is declared vacant. On motion it is

Ordered, That Dr. R. S. Primrose be and hereby is appointed to fill the vacancy this day declared to exist in the office of Coroner of Craven county, and the clerk is hereby instructed to notify him of said appointment and upon his acceptance thereof to come forward and give bond as required by law.

Whereas, Christopher C. Bell, Treasurer-elect of Craven county, having failed to present his official bond for said office on the 1st of Dec. 1892, as required by law, it is

Ordered, That the said office of Treasurer of Craven county be and hereby is declared vacant. On motion it is

Ordered, That Dr. R. S. Primrose be and hereby is appointed to fill the vacancy this day declared to exist in the office of Treasurer of Craven county, and the clerk is hereby instructed to notify him of said appointment and upon his acceptance thereof to come forward and give bond as required by law.

Whereas, C. L. Wetherington, Sheriff elect of Craven county, has tendered his resignation of said office to this board, on motion it is

Ordered, That said resignation be and hereby is accepted and that the said office of Sheriff of Craven county be and hereby is declared vacant. On motion it is

Ordered, That Wm. B. Lane be and hereby is appointed to fill the vacancy this day declared to exist in the office of Sheriff of Craven county, and the clerk is hereby instructed to notify him of said appointment and upon his acceptance thereof to come forward and give bond as required by law.

Ordered, That Thompson Wiggins, Township No. 1, be relieved from payment of double tax for 1892, upon payment of a single tax.

Ordered, That a voucher of \$2.00 per month be issued to Isaac Taylor, Township No. 5, for the support of Amos Chapman and daughter, said allowance to begin from 1st of November last.

Ordered, That the report of W. M. Watson, Clerk Superior Court and the report of J. W. Bible, Register of Deeds to Board of Commissioners of Craven county be approved and recorded in the book of Officers Reports.

Ordered, That the tax assessed to Judge Seymour for lot on King street valued at \$400 be remitted, the same having been sold to Clark & Co. and listed by them for taxation.

Ordered, That the poll tax charged against Edward Whitford, Township No. 1 for 1892, be remitted, he being over 50 years of age.

Ordered, That the tax issued against Jno. R. Miller, Township No. 1, be remitted, he owning no land in Craven county.

Ordered, That the petition of citizens of Township No. 7, praying for removal of Austin Brown, road overseer, be referred to road supervisors of said township.

Ordered, That the further consideration of the bond of Jos. L. Hahn, Register of Deeds-elect be postponed to 3 o'clock p.m.

Whereas, the resignation of Mr. Jesse Broadway as a member of fence commissioner of Township No. 3, is this day tendered by Commissioner Carr. It is ordered that the same be and hereby is accepted and that W. W. Arnold is appointed a member of said commission in lieu of said Broadway resigned, and that the clerk of this Board is hereby instructed to notify said Arnold of his appointment.

Ordered, That the petition of Francis Winslow, Lieut. Commanding Division Naval Reserve, be referred to the county attorney with instructions to examine the same and report to the next meeting of this board, as to the power of the same to make the appropriation therein asked.

Ordered, That J. A. Bryan, chm's, take such action as may be necessary to collect taxes due by R. P. Williams and R. P. Williams, agt.

On motion the Board took a recess to 8 o'clock.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Class Front Alarm Boxes—Reports—Extension of Water Works—Time—Resolutions of Respect.

Dec. 6, 1892.

Board convened in regular session, Mayor Manly presiding, present Councilmen Ellis, Street, Lovick, Latham, Roberts, Crawford and Eulank.

Minutes last meeting read and adopted. On motion the regular order of business was suspended to receive the reports of committees.

Chairman Ellis, Fire Dept. committee reported that the excel by tapper ordered had been received and in his recommendation the fire alarm boxes with glass front was adopted. The clerk was instructed to get from the Chief Engineer 10 keys.

On motion the bond of James Maxwell for constructing Atlantic engine boiler was received.

Finance, Sanitary, and Police committees nothing special.

Chairman Ellis, S. & P. committee reported the work on South F. at street rapidly progressing, mail was arriving and recommended ordering sufficient sewer pipe to complete.

On motion of Councilman Crawford ordering the pipe was left with S. & P. committee with power to act.

On motion of Councilman Eulank a new pump will be placed corner German and New South Front streets.

Chairman Roberts, W. & D. committee reported wharf foot Eden street completed.

Chairman Latham, reported the city well lighted, had ordered 2 incandescent lights at foot Middle St. and placed other lights designated.

On motion Councilman Eulank, an oil lamp will be furnished in front of Gilfield church in Farnville.

On motion of Councilman Ellis the Lewis Mercer Construction Co., was given the contract to drain Moonshine alley district, at \$850; voting aye, Councilmen Ellis, Street, Lovick, Latham, Roberts, Crawford and Eulank.

The following resolution offered by Councilman Ellis was adopted:

Whereas, it is now believed that the E. C. Land & Railway Co., is active in good faith, and using every effort for an early completion of the road to our City, &c. in course of construction by said E. C. Land & Railway Co., and whereas the City of New Berne is favorably disposed toward the said E. C. Land & Railway Co., and desirous of seeing said early completion of said road.

Resolved, That the action of this Board at its session of March 1st, 1892, in passing resolutions pertaining to the above mentioned matter, be and hereby is rescinded.

Resolved further, That the E. C. Land & Railway Co., be notified of this action of the Board, and be assured of the good will of the citizens of New Berne through their representatives, the Board of Commissioners of the said city of New Berne.

On petition of Francis Winslow, Lieut. Comd'g. division of Naval Reserves the following resolution introduced by Councilman Street was adopted, voting aye, Councilmen Ellis, Street, Lovick, Latham, Roberts, Crawford and Eulank.

Resolved, That a voucher for \$25.00 be issued monthly to the commanding officer of the New Berne Division of the Naval Artillery of the State Guard for the purchase and maintenance of an armory for the said division.

Provided, That before the issuance of said voucher the said commanding officer shall certify under oath that 32 members of the organization be present at least one drill during the preceding month.

Provided further, That all disbursements of the fund the appropriation shall be open to the inspection of this Board.

Passed.

The time for completion water works was extended six months from this date, provided Wm. C. Clarke within 30 days deposits with the city clerk a bond of five thousand dollars, to be approved by the Mayor and Board of Council.

The time to complete the street railway was extended to May 1st, 1893.

The mayor retired and Councilman Ellis took the chair.

The following persons were granted license to sell liquors at their respective places of business until May next:

NAVAL RESERVE.

Petition Appropriation With Reasons Thereof.

To the Hon. Board of Commissioners of the city of New Berne:

Respectfully—On behalf of the division of naval reserves, recently organized in the city of New Berne, we respectfully present to you the following:

1st. That the organization is composed of 48 active and 100 reserves, and comprises some of the best citizens of this city and county.

2nd. That it has been authorized by act of Congress and by the provisions of the Code of North Carolina, that it has been formally accepted by the State and is officially known as the 53rd Division, First Battalion, Naval Artillery, North Carolina State Guards.

3rd. That the organization is a military one and designed for usefulness both ashore and afloat. That under the laws of the State it can at any time be called to the support of the civil authority, to preserve order or suppress riot, and that it does and will stand ready at all times to answer such a call.

4th. That this is the only military organization within 60 miles of Craven county, that in case of emergency aid would have to be supplied from Goldsboro or Washington at a great loss of time and at great expense to the city of New Berne and Craven county.

5th. That while the Federal Government supplies the organization with arms and equipments, the members have to furnish their own uniforms and give their time without compensation, and that the number of companies allowed aid from the State, being now complete, this organization receives no aid whatever from the State.

6th. That at present this division has no place for exercise, or safe-keeping of its arms and equipments.
