Most Improved Wood-Working Machinery.
Mr. C. Reizenstein, Secretary of the Fair, has on exhibition at his office, samples of fancy wood-work from Mr. M. B. Tidey, of the Heidenberg works, Newark, N. J. The work is delicate, novel and beautiful. Mr. Tidey will make a display of his machines and work at the New Berne Fair.
The machines that he will bring are now at Chicago to be exhibited at the World's Fair and will be brought from there to New Berne ahead of time to insure their being here in full time for our Fair.
There will be four of the machines shown and all will be in operation. One is a saw table and attachments for carpenters work; another is a swing saw and tables for plow box or carpenter's work, etc., the third is a band saw, and the fourth a rip saw table, for box or case making.
These machines are all of the best and latest of their kind and to see them at work will not only give pleasure but also profitable instruction especially to those engaged in mechanical arts.
The Fair managers are doing their full duty in getting up new attractions for the Fair. Now let all our citizens emulate their example by providing in full time a fine supply of such exhibits as fall in their line to make. See to it that every department of the Fair goes forward as it should.

The Commencement of Rev. Edw. Bull's Trip for Fair.
Ed. JOURNAL.—I didn't promise when I saw you a little while before leaving, that I would write you, but as you indicated that would be a very proper thing to do, I will try occasionally to give you a few "Notes by the way."
When I left New Berne a considerable part of the people were on runners. An unusually large installment of the beautiful snow for this latitude had made sleighing (and snowballing) possible. The turn outs (not elegant were unique and ingenious—the favorite style seeming to be made up by removing the wheels from a buggy and substituting a pair of plank runners, a foot wide, and six or eight feet long. With a good team in front, a lively crowd of boys and girls within, a dozen, two along side, two along side, two on their sleds, hitched behind, with the tritinnabulation of the bells all over, and a shower of snowballs, all round, they seemed to be having a very enjoyable season.
The cars left on time, and came near leaving your correspondent at the same time. The hurry incident to Christmas business being over, it was not considered necessary to run the train, so it was allowed to walk, and sometimes by way of diversifying the fact, to creep. Even then we managed to get ahead of "time," and at every station waited for him to come up—a thing which he would never have done for us, for the old and true proverb says "waits for no man."
The passengers though not numerous were all of the "male persuasion," except one nice little woman, a bride of two or three days, who traveled a few miles with us, going to her new home. Apparently, to her, "Life was like a story, without a sob or sigh." We have no account of ill, in word or thought, for those to whom "the lines have fallen in pleasant places." Sometimes, at least, the pathway seems to be strewn with roses roses which conceal no thorns.
At one place where we "waited," we saw the society of the Geyers, with somewhat of a changed appearance, a new name and a new proprietor, it is very much the same home like place.
After supper, we spent the evening very cozily, and before time for retiring the clouds all clear away and the moon reigns again queen of the night, and an earnest of bright days to come.
Grand Souvenir Performance.

The State Swamp Lands.
State Engineer, Gen. W. G. Lewis, has during the year, he reports, surveyed 70,000 acres of the swamp lands. These surveys were made in Craven, Jones, Carteret and Pamlico counties. He states that the number of acres of these lands now held by the State approximately 800,000. The largest body is in Tyrrell county—140,000 acres. These lands lie in six counties extending from Columbus on the south to Pamlico on the north. All save 125,000 acres have been surveyed. Next Spring the survey will be continued.—Farboro Southerner.
