IT cannot be said of criminal trials, as it has been said of some other matters, that "they manage these things better in France." The Judge who presides at the Panama Canal trials appears to be Judge, prosecuting attorney, and jury. He examines the accused, and lectures them on their turpitude. If they refuse to answer his questions the refusal is regarded as evidence of guilt and if they do answer, the reply is put down in evidence against them. This form of criminal procedure would scarcely be permitted in a Police Court in other lands.

LOCAL NEWS.

E. W. Smallwood D. S. Jones and Capt. Waters killed a fine lot of mallards and black ducks yesterday.

Mrs. Mary Dennis, wife of Mr. A. H. Dennis died very suddenly at her home on Bogue Saturday. The cause of death is supposed to be heart disease.

The Falcon Economist mentions that very fine oysters are now brought to the factories in Elizabeth City from Ocracoke and Edenton, N. C.

The weather bureau promises snow or rain today. That looks a little rough but coupled with it is the gratifying assurance that the weather will be warmer.

Hicks predicts that there is going to be very hard and stormy weather, through the months of March and April. He says heavy snow storms and much cold may be looked for.

The Wilmington Star tells that Sylvanus Bryan killed an entire flock of 13 mallards, and 2 bull-necks in addition to one shot. He continued his hunt until he had bagged 32 ducks.

Monday night was the coldest yet. The thermometer registered 6. The lowest before was 7, 1-2. The highest point reached Tuesday was 29 1-2, a difference of 23 1-2 degrees during the 24 hours.

The Falcon-Economist says the news has reached Elizabeth City that Capt. Chas. Roughton, of the schooner Capitola was drowned in Albemarle sound during the heavy snow storm on Friday night January 6th.

By request the list of donors to the relief fund for the poor of the city will be kept standing for awhile and be added to from day to day as other citizens contribute or those who have already contributed increase their amounts.

Mr. Hill Humphrey went up to Raleigh yesterday to work in behalf of the steam ferry that is designed to be established for freight and passenger traffic between this city from Union Point and the opposite sides of both Neuse and Trent rivers.

They report one very touching case, that of an old afflicted colored man who had been without fire during the entire cold spell.

A very peculiar accident is reported as having occurred at Littleton, Halifax county. Mrs. J. R. Burney, a widow lady who lives in the place, was sweeping the snow from the rear piazza of her residence when she slipped on the ice and fell, breaking her neck, this resulting, of course, in instant death. She had just been cautioning several of her children, who had been playing around her, against falling.

THE KNITTING FACTORY.

Monday Men by Co-Operation Can Largely Increase Its Benefits—This Should be Promptly Done.

The proprietors of the New Berne Knitting factory, having satisfied themselves, though on a limited scale, that it can be profitably carried on in New Berne under fine condition, think the time has come to invite the co-operation of such of our citizens as feel an interest in its development and extension, with a view to making it of established benefit to the city. The fullest information will be given, and any suggestions bearing on the subject will be appreciated by the gentleman now engaged in the business. The complete memorandum that has been kept of every item of expense connected with the factory thus far makes the gratifying showing that it has been run at a profit though every operation in the factory was taken as a perfectly green hand and had to be learned from the beginning. This being the case as experience adds skill still better results may be confidently expected.

And another point, the factory is now in such shape that its capacity can be doubled at a very small additional outlay. This of course would considerably reduce the proportion of cost of the output and correspondingly increase the profit. This fact does not need elaborating to the intelligent reader who will perceive it readily.

We have long desired the establishment of a knitting factory on a fairly large scale, and on a solid basis. This opportunity now presents itself for this desired result to be attained. We hope there will be no dilatoriness in the matter but our business men and capitalists will at once consult with Messrs. Righton & Woodruff in regard to the matter, seize the golden opportunity and give the city a flourishing industry which will prove of enduring benefit.

The Relief Work.

The relief committee appointed at the meeting Monday night to raise funds for the poor, met at the court house yesterday morning and appointed a committee of five to apportion the funds and wood raised among the benevolent societies that decide as to who are needy and worthy to become recipients. Printed 10, 25, and 50 cent tickets are given instead of money. Any grocery or dry goods store in the city can take them with impunity. They will be cashed immediately upon presentation to the treasurer of the relief committee, Mr. T. A. Green at the Citizens bank.

RULES FOR TRIALS OF SPEED.

1. Entrance fee, 10 per cent. of purse.
2. At least four horses to enter and two to start.
3. Money divided—50 per cent. to first horse, 25 per cent. to second, 15 per cent. to third, and 10 per cent. to fourth.
4. Entries for all races close at 9 o'clock p. m., February 1. One-half of entrance money payable on February 1, and one-half by or before 9 o'clock p. m., February 15th.
5. In entering horses, the name, age, sex and color of the animal must be given, with name of sire and dam, if known; also name and residence of owner, accompanied by the last payment, by or before 9 o'clock p. m., February 15, 1893.
6. Records made after January 1, 1893, are no bar to these races.
7. The Society reserves the right to change the programme to meet the casualties of the weather. Should the weather be so inclement on any day of the Fair week as to prevent the Director from starting the races, such races at the option of the Executive Committee, may be declared "off," and the entrance money for them refunded. Heats in each day's races may come off alternately, according to the orders of the Director.
8. The National Trotting Association Rules will govern all trotting trials, except that no horse shall be entitled to more of the purse than is offered by the Society for the place he obtains.
9. No premiums paid to distanced or ruled-out horses. Premiums will be paid on Saturday of Fair week, by Secretary, on certificate of the Judges, and countersigned by the Director of Department in Trials of Speed.
10. All horses entered for these races, except Nos. 2 and 7, must have been owned in North Carolina on or before September 1st, 1892.
- Our track being little short the starting point will be set back the proper distance to make the full mile.
