The funeral services of Mrs. Caroline Pulley were held yesterday from the depot, Rev. Rufus Ford officiating.

The cold weather drove some wild ducks right up to the city yesterday. A few were killed at the foot of Pollock street.

Prof. W. R. Skinner returned to Clinton yesterday to close up his business affairs there. He will move back to New Berne in about two weeks.

The members of the New Berne Yacht Club are preparing an excellent and varied entertainment for the benefit of the club. It will contain both musical and dramatic features.

Old papers for pasting up in houses will be given free to all persons who need them as long as the severe weather last by calling at the JOURNAL office. Five thousand can be supplied in packages of two dozen each.

Messrs James Gaskins and Thomas Caraway report a fine hunt. They secured a large number of mallards and black ducks besides other smaller varieties and quantities of birds. Their string of game was eight feet long. Besides the ducks one of them got a ducking.

The temperature compared with the days immediately preceding was moderate yesterday. The lowest point reached by the thermometer during the 24 hours ending at 6 o'clock last night was 23, and at one time during the day it went up to 32-1-2. The slushy snow under foot, however and the dampness in the atmosphere made the day a very disagreeable one.

It must not be supposed that the means contributed by our citizens to the general relief fund which is published each morning in the JOURNAL represents all that they are doing. It is time for every farmer to raise all the meat he eats and enough more to do his share of supplying the town at which he trades, also that neither may have to buy from distant markets.

Thursday Messrs. P. H. Pelletier and S. C. Hamilton, sold out their interest in the Hudson Lumber Co., to Messrs. C. E. Goodwin and Z. R. Folsom the other members. They will carry on the business as heretofore under the same firm name. We are pleased to note however that the change will not cause Mr. Hamilton to move away from New Berne. He lives the city as well since he has been here, that he has decided to make it his home.

**Relief Notes.**  
A very liberal donation came in from Vanceboro yesterday for the relief fund. It was a check for \$25.00 from Mr. Wm. Cleve sent to Mayor Manly.

In distributing provisions, wood, etc., it has been found somewhat difficult to always find those who are most needy. A number of worthy cases have as yet been overlooked and on the other hand a number have been helped who should not have been.

One car load of wood was secured for distribution yesterday. A portion of it was distributed and the remainder held for today. A raft of small logs was also purchased from the mill of J. B. Clark & Co., for distribution. The work of cutting it up and distributing is still in progress.

The Relief Committee will meet again at the city hall this morning at 10 o'clock. It is now well organized and is carrying on its work according to the plan first outlined. Those who contribute to the fund can feel satisfied that their gifts will be well placed.

**The Inauguration.**  
Governor Carr was sworn into office Wednesday by Chief Justice Shepard. The weather was very inclement, but a great crowd, among them many distinguished men and many ladies were present.

The inauguration address was conservative in tone and gave great satisfaction.

**Two Stoves to the Room.**  
The unusually cold weather has been so severe that a single stove in each of the Collegiate Institute rooms which has answered all requirements heretofore, failed to keep it properly warm, and an additional stove has been put in each room.

The snow caused the valley gutter of the Collegiate Institute to break yesterday, and the consequence was a flood sufficient to prevent the holding of school. The trouble has been remedied and school will be held to-day.

All rooms will be thoroughly warm and comfortable in every way.

**Commendable Work.**  
Our citizens have acted most nobly in their efforts to relieve any distress that comes to their knowledge. The public fund subscribed is by no means the extent of what has been done. All classes of those who were able and especially some of our noble women have made great sacrifices upon their home supplies of clothing and provisions. The quiet method that has been pursued in innumerable instances would swell to a large sum.

Another very commendable service is that of those who have given up their private business in making the public distributions.

**What a Horse Can do on Different Roads.**  
One of the best arguments for good roads is contained in a calculation recently published in one of the Engineering papers.

It states that on the worst roads, not muddy, but sandy, a horse can draw only twice as much as he carry on his back, on a fair earth road, three and a half times as much; on a good macadamized road, nine times as much; on a smooth plank road, twenty-five times as much; on a stone track-way, thirty-three times as much—and on metal rails, fifty-four times as much.

The men who use the country roads can therefore see the advantage of having them in good condition.

Three more car loads of wood arrived yesterday. A large lot is expected to-day.

Messrs. E. H. & J. A. Meadows received a small supply of corn from Kinston last night.

The weather bureau's telegram yesterday afternoon predicted colder weather this morning.

Mr. Nelson Whitford has good pickled beet which he will sell to persons holding Relief Tickets for 6c. per lb.

The Board of Directors of the Y. M. C. A. will meet this evening at 8 o'clock. This meeting was appointed at the meeting last Friday night.

At the Relief committee meeting held yesterday morning a petition was sent in from James city. Some of the people there have been reduced to considerable straits.

There is not a wood yard in the city that has a cord of wood left. The consumption has largely increased and the usual way for getting it to the river—by rail—is unavailable—frozen up. The railroad is the only dependence.

It is thought that the Grand jury of Wake county, which has been investigating the grave charges against S. Otho Wilson as being the head of Gideon's band are about to return a bill. All the witnesses are men of prominence.

Provisions in several lines are a little scarce. A few days ago some of the grocery had to beg for their customers on staple article. "We are out of that, got it ordered by water but the boats are frozen up." Now however, they generally couple with the announcement, "We have some coming by rail, but it has not had time to get here yet."

The Elizabeth City Carolinian says: The Greenville Reflector refers to a present of ripe tomatoes kept by a parson in his store since the early fall frosts. The editor of the Carolinian transferred a quantity from his garden to his cellar, where they kept on ripening, supplying him with the delicious vegetable up to Christmas.

The Morganton Herald says: The present cold snap is said by the citizens of Morganton to be the most severe since the memorable winter of 1881. For the first time since that date the Catawba river is frozen over from bank to bank and the ponds are covered with six inch ice. Tuesday was pronounced the most disagreeable day ever experienced in the town and on Tuesday night the mercury dropped to 4 deg. above zero, a remarkably low temperature for this latitude. On the Blue Ridge plateau the thermometer has been several degrees below zero, and in Mitchell county teams are being driven across the frozen streams and the roads are filled with deep snow drifts that render travel almost impossible.

**A Divided Town.**  
The Greenville Reflector says that Grifton, a place of only about a thousand inhabitants can lay claim to more divisions perhaps, than any other small place on the continent. It is situated in two counties, three townships, two congressional districts, two senatorial districts and two judicial districts. The creek running through the centre of the town is the dividing line between Pitt and Lenoir counties.

**Poor Burning Fluids.**  
Now let our legislature establish a system of oil inspection for North Carolina. The States North have such laws, and it is believed that it has caused North Carolina to be the dumping ground for all of the inferior grades of oil. Many eyes have been injured by oil that was sold for high test.—Hobbesonian.
