Wednesday night the Board of Common Council met in and after thorough discussion and work until a late hour awarded the contract for the construction of a system of water work for the city of New Berne to the Lewis Mercer Construction company (the franchise, for the full and complete conthereof and extended.

At the expiration of five years the city board of three non-resident hydraulic engineers in the selection of whom the city council and the water works company shall have equal powers.

The general plan of the said system shall be as follows:

MAINS:-The pipe system shall conist of not less than seven and a half nches of cast iron pipe of sizes varying from 12 inches, to six inches inclusive the 11 inch pipe to extend to and through the city. The pipes are to be of the best quality of cast iron, water pipe, of stan- Growth of Textile Industries. lard weight and coated with Dr. Argus Smiths preservative varnish. They are to be laid on the best possible manner and tested by hydrostatic pressure, of 300 pounds to the square inch.
