The annual celebration of Mardi Gras is now being held at New Orleans. These festivities are always attended with much pomp and splendor and attract wide attention.

The entertainment at the memorial chapel was a splendid success. There is a general expression of high gratification as the entertainment surpassed expectations both in its excellence and in financial results.

The Morehead City News mentions the shipment of thirteen car loads of fish, oysters and clams in one day from that place. Remember, that a car load means about 40,000 pounds, and the magnitude of this shipment from a place of less than 3,000 inhabitants will be realized.

Two more race horses arrived on the steamer Albemarle for the Fair yesterday. Exhibits are also beginning to be sent to the city. It is time now for every one both in town and country to put forth their best efforts. This is the week for the exhibits to be received and arranged.

A terrible burning affair occurred near Dover, New Hampshire. The insane asylum was burned and forty-four inmates perished in the flames. It was a wooden building and burned very rapidly.

Thirty-four bodies have been taken from the ruins, but most of them can not be recognized. It is not known how the fire caught.

Prof. G. W. Rogers, of Baltimore, a most expert Punch and Judy man has arrived to exhibit at the East Carolina Fair. Mrs. Rogers also came in with the professor. Prof. Rogers will have shadowgraphs, Punch and Judy, banjo and comic songs (and a very comical musical act, all for 10 cents. He gives a remarkably good variety show for a small amount of money.

The S. W. L. Society will meet Wednesday night instead of Tuesday, the regular time. This is on account of the Valentine party, which the King's Daughters will hold in the Collegiate Institute Tuesday night. The S. W. L. first announced that they would change to Monday night, but found that would not be well on account of the meeting of the Naval Reserve—so the change now announced was substituted.

Has any one seen a belted buzzard? Mr. F. S. Erul caught one of these birds in a steel trap in January and after placing a bell around his neck turned him loose. His buzzardship upon regaining his freedom struck a bee line in a westerly course and halted not as far as seen. Having seen a body in the east he may have continued to follow Horace Greely's advice, "Go West," and be pursued "the even terror of his way" possibly he is among the "Rockies" by this time.

The Dangerous Cigarette.

All over New Berne at almost an hour's youngsters of every age can be seen smoking cigarette. We judge this will be found to be the case in any city of the state notwithstanding the law against selling cigarettes to boys. The Charlotte Observer notices the fact and comments on it thus:

"The laws of North Carolina make it a misdemeanor for any dealer in the State to sell cigarettes to any boy under 17 years of age. Is this law observed in Charlotte? If it is, there is a lot of crooked work going on, for any day groups of chaps from 9 to 12 years old can be seen smoking cigarettes on the streets of Charlotte. Some of them are so proficient as to be able to blow the smoke from their nostrils after the most approved style. The news refers to this matter to urge the Legislature to take the cigarette evil in hand once more.

A South American Sloth.

Among the exhibits which Prof. Rogers of Baltimore, has for the East Carolina Fair is a fine sloth, which he procured from South America at great expense especially for this Fair.

Prof. Rogers informs us that this is the only one of these animals in the United States. They are not so easy to obtain, and their habits are so peculiar that they nearly always die on the passage. They subsist on a vegetable and fruit diet, and never come to the ground for anything.

Another extraordinary fact about them is that they are never known to drink water. During the seven months that Prof. Rogers has had this one, he has never taken a drop of any liquid—though it has been repeatedly offered. Their very long claws by which they hang back downward from trees, being curved upward, rendered them as helpless as an infant if they are put on the ground; but up a tree they are as much at home as a swan is in the water, and play around in a way that attracts much attention.

A tree of convenient size will be procured for this one at the Fair in which he can "gyrate" to his heart's content, while he is on exhibition.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

THIRTY-SECOND DAY.

SENATE.

The bill to provide for the State Normal and Industrial School at Greensboro came up on its third reading.

Resolution relating to the Confederate monument, was on motion of Mr. Sherill taken up. The resolution providing for a committee to consider an appropriation for a Confederate monument was adopted.

Bill to amend chapter 399 of the laws of 1885, passed third reading.

Bill in relation to the sale of real or personal property by trustee or mortgagee, requiring affidavits that the property has been properly advertised, was recommitted to the committee.

The Senate met again at 1:15 o'clock and the bill to establish Scotland county came up and was postponed till next day.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

Mr. Parker, of Jones, to protect fish in Trent river.

Mr. McJohm, to amend chapter 337, laws of 1891, prohibiting the sale of spirituous liquors at Ayden, in Pitt county.

Mr. Dey, to amend chapter 274, laws of 1887, concerning fish in Currituck Sound.

Bill to divide the crime of murder into two degrees was tabled, on motion of Mr. Rowe.

Bill to amend section 1478 of the Code relating to the distribution of personal estate, passed third reading.

Bill to extend the remedy by injunction in cases of trespass on land, was, on motion, tabled.

In Senate amendment to bill to prohibit bodies of men known as detectives from going armed, the House refused to concur. Speaker Overman appointed a conference committee to confer with a similar committee from the Senate in regard to the matter.

Bill to secure the right of trial by jury in cases in which land has been condemned for railroad purposes.

The Senate amendment, that this bill be applicable to cases now pending was not concurred in on motion of Mr. Allen.

For bill to amend chapter 320, laws of 1891, concerning traveling on railroads, steamboats, &c., the committee offered a substitute allowing all persons to travel on free passes, if in the interest of orphan asylums. The substitute was adopted and the bill thus amended passed its second reading.

Catching and Kissing Bullets.

Mr. Edron—The article in your issue of the 10th inst., under the caption of "Catching and Kissing Bullets," suggests an anecdote that is told of Col. Wm. Polk, formerly of Raleigh, who was Major of the 9th Regiment of North Carolina Continentals.

At the battle of Germantown, Pa., fought October 4, 1777, in which his Brigadier General, Francis Nash of Hillsboro, was mortally wounded, Major Polk was also severely wounded, shot in the face. Some time after the battle, at a ball given, it is said, in the historic Chew house in Germantown, to the Americans, a famous belle of those days was much sought as a partner in the dance by the young officers. She refused all invitations, however, saying that she should continue to do so until she danced her way through the ranks of the young North Carolinians who caught his enemies' bullets in his mouth, and spat them out again in defiance at his foe.

Col. Polk was the father of the "Bishop General" Leonard Polk who was killed in the late civil war at Pine Mount, Ga., in 1864. G. D.

The Wilmington and Weldon Railroad Taxes.

The Joint Legislative Committee on Railroads and Railroad Commission held a secret session last night to further consider the settlement of the Wilmington and Weldon taxes. It was decided to reject the proposition made by the railroad to the committee and another proposition was made by the committee to the railroad. It is understood to be the sense of the committee to settle the question by accepting three years back taxes on the main line and all branches, a complete surrender by the railroad of all exemptions, including the rate-fixing provision in the charter, and to grant control to the legislature of stems from the main line, not exceeding thirty miles in length.—News & Observer 10th inst.

Notice is hereby given of the incorporation of the New Bern Knitting Mills Company; that the names of the incorporators are Henry Hinton, James M. Howard and I. H. Feltner, and such others as they may associate with them. That the principal place of business shall be in New Bern, N. C., and its general purpose and business is to manufacture Cotton, Wool, Flax, Silk, and any and all kinds of fabric into hosiery, underwear, yards, cloths, and such other articles of ware and of commerce as the stockholders and Directors may from time to time desire to, and to establish dye houses, ginneries, and such other conveniences as may be necessary for the purpose of carrying out the full and complete work of the said corporation.

The duration of the corporation shall be thirty years. The corporation shall be empowered to buy and hold lands to buy and sell lands, to erect buildings, and buy all and every kind of machinery and to sell the same.
