Samuel Willis, col. of Vanceboro was tried in Federal court yesterday for selling liquor without license and convicted. E. F. White shared the same fate. Pronouncing sentence was postponed until today. A colored man of Wayne county was found not guilty, and the case of R. C. Cleve for selling liquor without license in Vanceboro was carried over to this morning.

An Available Force Necessary. In reference to the State having to order out the militia the Charlotte Observer very wisely says:

"It is at times of emergency that people expect much of the State Guard, and among those who expect it are no doubt some of the cranks who came near abolishing the organization. Ex-Gov. Holt, who always takes a clear view of matters and knows whereof he speaks, remarked this morning that he would not be Governor unless he had a military force available to enforce law and order."

It is well at all times for any government to have a sufficient military force to meet any emergency that might arise in protection of law-abiding citizens. New Berne has an organization known as the Naval Reserve. It is composed of six young men as there are in the city, and though they have exhibited nothing but a true loyal spirit, some of our citizens have seen fit to twit them, which to say the least, comes in bad taste, especially from such who had failed to respond to the summons of the Sheriff.

The Reserve has never failed to respond to the call of duty and it never will.

JAMES CITY SUCCEUMS.

Seven Companies of Armed Soldiers Prove a Powerful Persuader.

The Squatters Talk Peaceably and Come to an Agreement With the Owner of the Property.

The committee of twelve which acts for the colored people of James City called on Gov. Carr Monday night and at his suggestion a meeting was held yesterday morning in James City. A special train took over to James City yesterday morning Governor Carr, Col. J. D. Whitford, a few attorneys and press representatives, together with the committee spoken of which had come to New Berne again, and also a committee of eight appointed by the colored people of Goldsboro at a mass meeting Sunday night to interest themselves in behalf of humanity and the law by endeavoring to save the occupants from the fate they were bringing upon themselves and to bring matters to a quiet settlement. The chairman of this committee was Rev. R. S. Rives and the secretary was Prof. E. E. Smith ex-Minister to Liberia, appointed under Cleveland's administration. They appeared to work throughout disinterestedly from pure motives.

The special train having arrived at James City, a portion of the inhabitants were found assembled around a speakers stand, beautified with floral decorations and becomingly furnished to do honor to the chief executive of the State. Gov. Carr proposed first to hold a private conference with the committee, and they separated from the general crowd and went over to the Samaritan Lodge of the town for the purpose.

The conference was of about an hour's duration, sufficient opportunity was given for each and all to say what they wished and every thing passed off quietly. The Governor kindly announced his friendship for them but firmly explained his position—not as a deciding officer—but as the upholder of the law, and the necessity for all to submit to its decrees.

Wm. Williams, the chairman of the James City committee talked submissively for the people, disavowed any intention of using violence to maintain possession of the property, voluntarily offered to vacate if it became necessary without putting the officers to the trouble of removing them. He said they would do this and not give the sheriff, the county, the State, the Governor or the military any further trouble whatsoever. The two colored lawyers of the city White and O'Hara did considerable talking to and for them, the former advised them in plain words of kindness and logical reasoning to take out the leases if the opportunity for doing so was still afforded them and Hon. F. M. Simmons used this voice effectively in behalf of law and showed them how they were bringing themselves into ill repute and how all attempted evasions of the law—locking of doors and other subterfuges were unavailing and Col. Whitford spoke a few timely words. The result of the conference was an agreement that the committee was to come over and see about arranging with Mr. Bryan, the owner of the property and were to report to the Governor in the afternoon at three o'clock. Governor Carr made this announcement to the general crowd, accompanied by words of extreme kindness coupled with firmness and then he and the others who went over on the train boarded it again and came back to the city at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Bryan having had so much trouble with the James City people, had at last decided in his mind not to lease to any one except the few—about eighty—who had signified their willingness to make terms, but after consultation with the Governor he decided to make the following proposition, namely:

To make the lease for three years at a monthly rental of not less than 50 cents or more than \$1.00 per lot per month. If the whole settlement, including all the inhabitants of James City, desire to move at any time, they can do so by each tenant paying the full rental of three years in cash. This does not apply to one but must include all.

All persons living in James City must accede to these terms and sign leases. There is to be no sub-letting without consent of lessor.

Mr. Bryan can determine the lease of water front lots at any time and cancel the same by giving ten days' notice in writing, and houses on water front shall be removed to some other lot in James City to be selected by the lessor. No lot shall exceed in size 50x100 feet. Lots shall be classified and rentals fixed by Mr. Bryan's agent.

The number of families in James City is 527. The population is stated to be 2514. They have three Baptist and one Methodist church, a school house and a public hall.

The committee through Attorney O'Hara reported last night that all the citizens were willing to sign the leases. This, if adhered to, and we doubt not it will be, will settle the matter.
