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### Honor to the Guard—Col. Bogart.

We call attention to the complimentary orders of Adjutant General Cameron to the State Guard which we publish this morning and also to those in memoriam of Lieut. Col. D. N. Bogart, who was accidentally killed by a fall from his horse while the guard was in New Berne.

The death of Col. Bogart was keenly felt by our citizens—this feeling was intensified by the fact that he came here—all the military did—at personal peril to uphold the laws and honor of the State. Appreciating this, our citizens and physicians though ever mindful of every obligation of humanity or friendship, were it possible even more solicitous than usual of General Bogart's welfare. The same, in simple justice may be said of the officers of the regiments and his other friends among the troops.

What time Col. Bogart was at the residence of Mr. E. B. Roberts the best of the house was freely and heartily tendered and every attention possibly given as if he had been a member of the family.

After his removal to the hotel, the proprietor of whom was connected with the family by marriage, the same unremitting care was kept up and four able physicians two of them the regimental surgeons and Drs. E. Duffy and R. S. Primrose of this city gave him the best medical skill possible and inquiries from him from all classes were kept up until his spirit took its flight.

A military guard kept watch with-out cessation from the time of the accident until the departure of his remains for his home and many—even personal friends were by them turned back through instructions of the attending physicians even after midnight because it was not well to have more with him than those ministering to his comfort.

And very early on the morning after his death, the New Berne Naval Reserve assembled to do honor to him and they, as well as the Washington company, accompanied the remains to the train, and early in the hour was the choicest flowers of the season in profusion were sent to beautify his burial case, and no way in which a token of esteem could be shown was left to pass unheeded.
