NEW EAST RIVER BRIDGE,

other Great Link Between New Tork and Brooklyn.

The proposed new East river ingo from New York city to Wil-meburg, a section of Brooklyn, widge in geneal appear ance. It will be 140 feet high, or 5 feet taller than the Brooklyn bridge, and 6,975 feet long, which is 76 ieet a excess of the length of the pres-nt East river bridge. The picture of the contemplated bridge is taken com Harper's Weekly.

The height of the piers of the new bridge above mean high water will be 282 feet. The piers differ from those of the Brooklyn bridge. They will be constructed of solid onry to a point 40 feet above the railroad way, and tneu there a dazzting combination.-Buffalo will be steel towers 110 feet in height. These will be built up with 35 upright colums, with horizontal and diagonal bracings. The bridge is to have a width of 88 feet; or 3 feet, more than the present one. The length of the cables will be 3,230 feet. Their diameter is to be 22 inches, or 6 1.4 more than

these of the old bridge. The wire used has an initial strength of 180,000 pcands to the square inch. For each of the four cables 17,000 single wires will be used. These will be made up into 10 smaller cables, which when bound with wire will form the , erfect cable. The dead weight these cables will stand is 136.000 tons, the weight of the bridge being only 26,000 tons.

The endless cable system used on the Brooklyn bridge will not be adosted by the builders of the new bridge. The grade will be so low that 40-ton locomotives may be run across the bridge drawing three or four cars. Work on the new bridge will be commenced the coming summer.

The third bridge across the East river will also be constructed within a few years It will be known as the Hudson avenue bridge and will have o clear span over the river of 1,470 feet, The bridge will extend from East Broadway and Grand street, New York. to Myrtle avenue and Audson street, Brooklyn,




