STILL BIGGER SHIPMENTS.

Forty-Three Car Loads of Truck—B-sides Steamer Shipments in One Day.

Yesterday we spoke of the great shipments of truck of the previous day but great as they were yesterday's shipments eclipsed them. It was a specially big day for potato shipment on the A. & N. C. R. R. Forty-three cars of truck was the amount it had and the cars were loaded check-a-block. There were in all 13,000 packages (8000 more than on the previous day) about 10,000 of these were barrels of potatoes.

Potatoes are selling now at \$3.00 to \$4.00 per barrel. Estimating at the lowest figures \$3.00; it will be seen that the railroad by itself, is saving \$80,000 worth of potatoes in one day, not to mention the other truck.

This section will have about \$75,000 worth of truck in Northern markets tomorrow morning.

The Commercial and Industrial Association of N. C.

At the meeting of the State Press Association held at New Bern last April Mr. A. H. Thompson, President of the Commercial and Industrial Association, addressed that body on matters relative to the development of the State. As was easily to be expected, the Press gave him full attention, and the immediate action of the Press Association was such as to greatly encourage him and the entire Commercial and Industrial Association in making further attempts to develop every resource of the State through organized effort.

The matters toward which the Association first directed its efforts were: The repeal of the Merchant's Purchase Tax, a State Banking System, and a Uniform Insurance Law.

The work of the Association during last year and through the last Legislature resulted in a radical modification of the Purchase Tax; the passage of a State Banking Law (drawn by Colonel Burgwyn, of Henderson), which the New York Journal of Commerce pronounced the best one ever passed by any State, and such reform of the Insurance Law as was most needed.

The matters before the Association now are: The State at the World's Fair, the improvement of Public Roads, Municipal Ownership of Gas, Electric and Water-works, to the end that cheap lights, power and water may be furnished to all manufacturing industries; Diversification of Crops, and the encouragement of Immigration of a Proper Class.

To deal with these matters properly, the Association want the advice and cooperation of every town in the State.

Twenty-four towns now have membership in the Association, viz: Beaufort, Carthage, Clayton, Greensboro, Henderson, Kinston, LaGrange, Morehead City, New Bern, Pamlico, Edsleigh, Burlington, Asheville, Salisbury, Wilson, Windsor, Nashville, Pittsboro, Sylva, Tarboro, Waynesville, Winston and Holly Springs.

The association can be made a powerful factor in leveling our State and in securing abiding benefits for all sections of it. Every village, town and city should be represented. Let each one form local organizations and send representatives to the State meeting which it comes off. It is desired to arrange for a grand meeting of the association to be held early in July.

Any place may secure proper representation in this meeting by the election of delegates from its Board of Trade, or the appointment of representatives by the Mayor of towns in which there may be no commercial or business organization or in any other way each town may deem proper.

More Cotton Planted Than Before.
In spite of advice to the contrary, it appears that the farmers of the State will raise more cotton this year than last. Bradstreet's says:

"A recent report on cotton crop prospects in North Carolina states that, whereas the acreage planted in 1892 was only 70 per cent. of that in 1891, the acreage planted this spring is 17 per cent. greater than a year ago, while the quantity of fertilizers used this year shows an increase of one-third. The gain in acreage planted is in sections where cotton and tobacco are both grown, farmers planting more cotton and less tobacco.
