The New Berne tower will be 15 feet 10 inches in diameter and 120 feet high. The first installment of the pipe for laying the street mains has arrived and been distributed on Broad street. Other pipe will shortly follow.

Certain material is needed for the roof of the pump-house. It is expected and as soon as it arrives the house will be finished.
