**CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**  
**Board** met in regular session, Mayor Ellis in the chair; present Councilmen Geroek, Lovick, Latham, Ulrich and Crawford.  
**Minutes** last meeting read and adopted. **J. J. Tolson** was granted permission to repair stables on Broad street.  
**To** make arrangements for a settlement of the Whitford and I. N. C. L. Co. case was referred to the Finance Committee with power to act.  
**The** matter of laying pipes by the water company was referred to Sanitary Committee and port physics also reported to the board.  
**Reports** of committees were given.  
**Chairman** Lovick, Finance Committee, going, and asked for further action in regard to Rough and Ready Co.  
**Motion** to move Adjutant to the tabled.

**Chairman** Latham, Sanitary Committee, the city in late rainy season and asked for additional appropriations for the block near H. Gray and for the sewer opening and 125 feet pipe per month.  
**Councilman** Geroek called attention to the condition of the dock at foot of Broad street.  
**Chap. 8, Sec. 5**, was amended as follows:  
 It shall be the duty of the Councilman to investigate the conditions of privies, back yards and other places in the city when the same are a nuisance or any privy, yard or other place is a nuisance or a health hazard, and in a bad or filthy condition, and the owner or tenant of such premises is guilty of an offense under the laws of this city, and to cause the same to be cleaned up and made conformable to the requirements of the laws of this city.  
**Motion** by Councilman Geroek, that the Sanitary Committee be authorized with the powers of a policeman, \$40 per month for 90 days.

**Chairman** Geroek, of the Finance Committee, on outpouring gas and recommended that in future all pipes in the city be required to swing in a hook. This will be done further an report.

**On** motion of Councilman Geroek, Chap. 8, Sec. 5, was amended as follows:  
 "May and Notwithstanding."  
**The** following ordinance was adopted:  
 Be it ordained that any person who shall place any refuse, garbage or other material in any street, alley, or public place, or in any open place, or in any place where the same is prohibited by law, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$200 for each offense.

**Motion** by Councilman Geroek, that **A. Brown** be granted permission to erect a building on the lot between Broad and Third streets, in the city of New Berne, N. C.

**Committee** appointed to investigate the condition of the city streets and other places, and to report thereon to the Council at their next meeting.

**Councilman** Latham, called attention to the Mayor and Clerk's report, \$2,900 each, at 6 per cent, for the month of February, 1893. He also called attention to the report of the engine boiler.

**Volting** eye, Councilmen Geroek, Lovick, Latham, Ulrich and Crawford.
